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Ralph Boal Injured **During SNORT Test**

Ralph Boal, SNORT project engineer, was seriously injured Thursday. May 10 in an accident during a test run being made at SNORT.

Sustaining injuries to his right knee and leg, caused by a 5."0 HVAR motor tube that ripped off a track sled at high speed, he was rushed to the Station infirmary where emergency measures were taken. He was subsequently transferred to San Diego Naval Hospital where his leg was amoutated before he was taken on Sunday to the Naval Hospital in Oakland.

Mrs. Boal, who was visiting relatives in Idaho, arrived at San Diego on Saturday and accompanied Mr. Boal to Oakland.

Quick action on the part of test engineer John Gardner, engineer Nate Rekosh, electricians R. E. Fitzgerald and W. A. Jones, and the infirmary ambulance crew enabled Boal to receive urgently needed attention and quick transfer to the infirmary.

Exact cause of the accident is being investigated.



BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

A PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS the armed forces of the United States have steadfastly served as champions of the security of our country; and

WHEREAS the members of the armed forces of the United States are now engaged in tasks which demonstrate to the world our free way of life, our desire to maintain peace with the rest of the world, and our aspiration to insure national security through better international understanding; and

WHEREAS, in order to maintain an essential ready reserve of trained military personnel, the armed forces of the United States are placing added emphasis on a reserve-forces program; and

WHEREAS it is appropriate that the armed forces of this Nation dedicate a special day each year to the demonstration of their operations and capabilities: and

WHEREAS it is desirable that the people of the United States and of the world be apprised of our unified program of Power for Peace: and


WHEREAS it is appropriate that the armed forces invite the public to visit on that day, so far as security requirements permit, posts, camps, stations, bases, vessels, armories, reserve centers, and other facilities:

NOW, THEREFORE, I, DWIGHT D. EISENHOWER, President of the United States of America and Commander in Chief of the armed forces of the United States, do hereby proclaim Saturday, May 19, 1956, as Armed Forces Day; and I direct the Secretary of Defense, and the Secretaries of the Army, the Navy, and the Air Force, as well as the Secretary of the Treasury on behalf of the Coast Guard to mark that day with appropriate ceremonies, to arrange for demonstrations and displays at armed forces installations, to invite participation by representatives of all religious faiths in such ceremonies in order that the independence of our security and the deep and abiding religious faith of Americans may be recognized. and to work hand in hand with civil authorities in arranging other supporting activities.

I also invite the Governors of the States, Territories, and possessions of the United States to provide for the observance of the day in such appropriate manner as will afford an opportunity for the people of the United States to become better acquainted with their armed forces.

And I call upon my fellow citizens not only to display the flag of the United States on Armed Forces Day, in manifestation of their recognition of the sacrifice and devotion to duty of the members of the armed forces, but also to avail themselves of the opportunity to further their knowledge of our defense posture and of the men and women who constitute our real national strength, by attending and participating in the local observances of the day.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Seal of the United States of America to be affixed.

The annual school trustee election will be held in the Cafetorium at the Burroughs School on Friday, May 18, with polls open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. The electorate will receive one ballot upon which they will vote for two members of the China Lake Board, one member of the Kern County Union High School District Board, and seven members of the Kern County School Board. All qualified electors of the China Lake School District will vote at the Burroughs School regardless of which precinct they voted at the last general election.

1 wo members are to be elected for the China Lake Board. Candidates for the positions are Newton E. Ward, incumbent, and Earl G. Love. Mrs. Doris Lipp is retiring from the board. The only candidate for the high school board is the incumbent, William T. Baldwin.

The election for the County Board is new this year. Seven areas are set up and the electorate will vote for one candidate from each area. China Lake is in the seventh area which comprises China Lake, Indian Wells Valley, Johannesburg, Randsburg, Mojave, and Rosamond. Hugh W. Hunter, China Lake, is the only candidate from the seventh area. Four of the areas have only one candidate, while there are choices in three of the areas. Write-in candidates are legal in California.

Even though the majority of the candidates are uncontested, each lectorate is urged to go to the polls and cast a ballot either for the candidates who have filed or for others of his choice. This is important in our American system of public education. The best way to keep the schools close to the public is to impress these boards with a large vote at the trustee elections. Several four and five-pounders were taken last week, but leadership is still held by Ralph Zoph, Lindsay, California, who boated an 8½-pound Brown on opening day.
