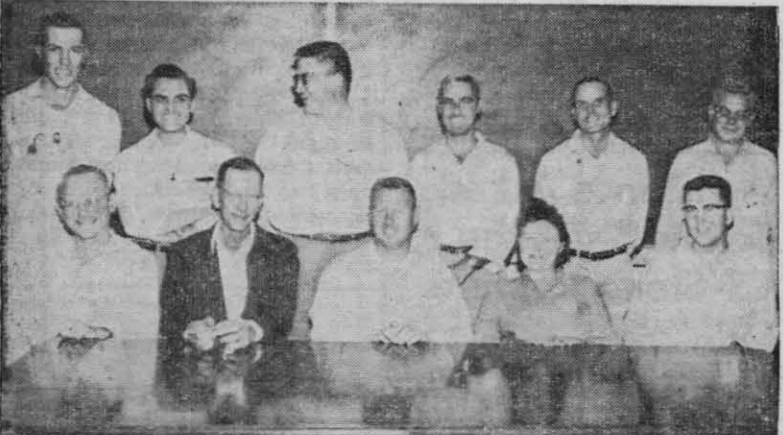

Bernie Locker Honored at Sports Night; Once 'Young Ketchel' to Boxing Fans

Back in 1925, before a packed house in Chicago's Marigold Arena, a ring announcer stepped to the microphone to call out the names of two boxers who were to meet in a preliminary match preceding the main bout. One of the eager, young boxers was a fellow named Bernie Locker, but for some unknown reason, probably to generate a little enthusiasm, the announcer pointed to Bernie's corner and bellowed... "and in this corner... Young Ketchel!" The name Ketchel, a magic one in boxing circles in those days, caught the attention of the crowd, and Bernie Locker stuck with the name "Young Ketchel" throughout the rest of his fighting career.

And yet this was probably Bernie's greatest night in the ring, for he was presented with a Civilian Meritorious Service Award by the Station for his contributions both at work and after work during his 11 years at NOTS.

Bernie has been training and teaching young servicemen how to box ever since he arrived on the Station in 1945, and matching them in boxing shows at the Station Gym. More than 800 were on hand last Thursday night to witness his latest Sport's Night.

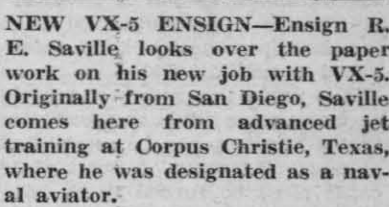

Dr. A. M. Zarem, president of Electro-Optical Systems, Inc. and Professor of Engineering at UCLA, recently presented two lectures on the Station.

The first lecture was given before a capacity crowd in the main conference room of Michelson Laboratory, while the second was delivered at the Institute of Radio Engineers Dinner-Dance Meeting at Pappalardo's Desert Inn. Both addresses dealt with solar energy.

Dr. Zarem discussed man's need for energy and the fact that he lives by his ability to command it. He also discussed new means of utilizing solar energy as well as contributions in applied science and engineering.

Bank Hours Change During Holidays

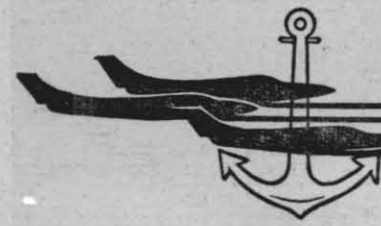

Red Cross Aiding Hungary; Affiliated With United Fund

In connection with the United Fund campaign it is well to be reminded of the tremendous role that American Red Cross is playing in the present world crisis. The 19th International Red Cross will meet for 12 days during the month of January in New Delhi, India.

Some 400 delegates from 85 countries will attend. It is the most important Red Cross conference to be held since the revision in 1929 of the original Geneva Convention of 1864. The major item on the agenda will be the proposal of international regulations concerning the protection of civilian populations from the dangers of indiscriminate warfare—proposals to

protect civilians from weapons of mass destruction, and the adoption of a new Red Cross convention. International Red Cross organizations in Geneva are mobilizing all their resources to relieve suffering caused by the armed conflicts in Hungary and the Middle East. Red Cross organizations have assumed commitments to provide for the basic needs of 20,000 Hungarian refugees in Austrian camps.

The International Committee of the Red Cross is qualified to act as a neutral intermediary in all questions of a humanitarian nature in times of trouble, including civil and international war.

This committee has negotiated with the Hungarian and Soviet authorities to allow international Red Cross relief supplies to enter Hungary, and it has transported and distributed these supplies, sent by individual governments and organizations, throughout Hungary.

In times of disaster and suffering, as well as in normal times, Red Cross is always on the job, here at home and all over the world, wherever needed.

The Kern Chapter of American Red Cross is a national affiliated agency of the Indian Wells Valley United Fund.

Members of the club will also serve at the Football Dads' Banquet scheduled for mid-December.

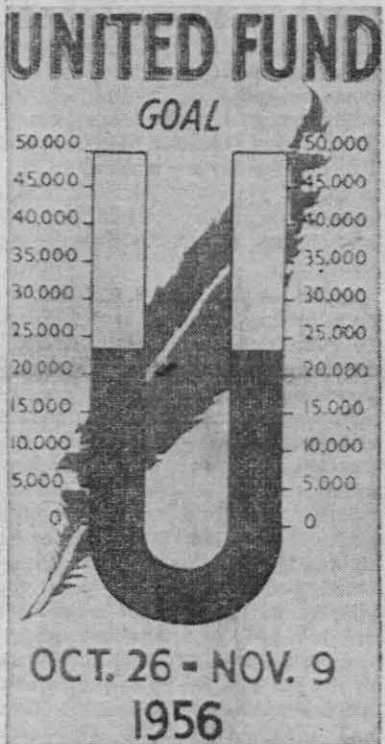
Dept. of Community Affairs Gives to Hungarian Relief

Author to Review Book For University Women

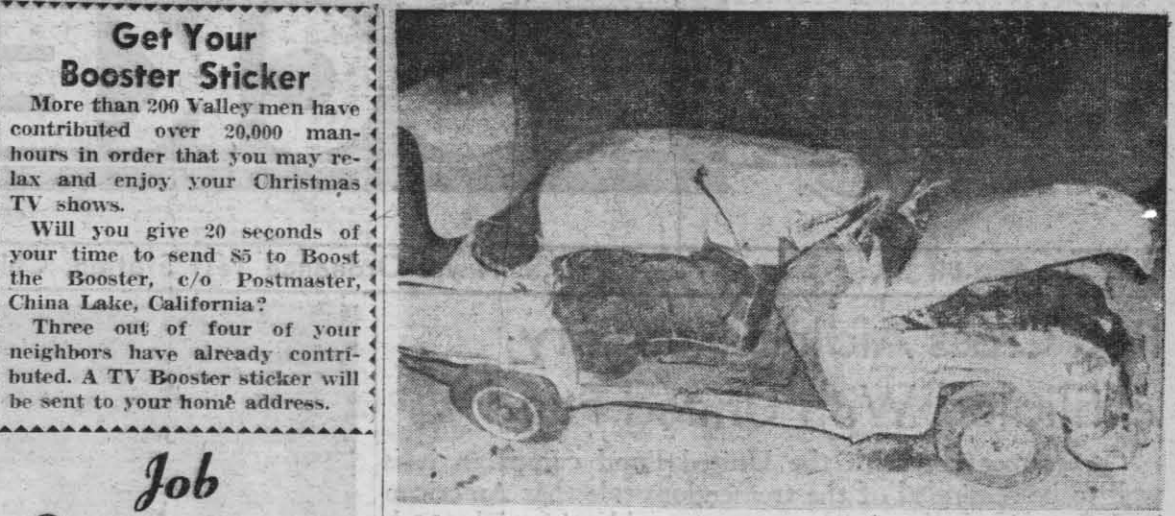
