Operators of children's boarding omes are required to obtain a cerificate of good health from their hysician, permits are obtained rom Community Services, children f the family are checked for necessary current immunizations, and the nurses inspect the homes and yards of these establishments.

If all the health code requirements are met satisfactorily, the issuance of a permit is recommended and the boarding home operators must are checked on contagion and necessary current immunization. As a result of the close supervision rendered by the public health nurses to children in boarding homes, the Station's immunization program is. maintained at a high level.

Nursery Schools Nursery schools are visited daily for inspections relative to safety, cleanliness, prevention of contagion, diet and compliance with immunization requirements.

Public Health Service Another important function of the Branch is a monthly inspection of female food handlers and beauty shop personnel on the Station. Moreover, twice a year these individuals are required to pass a physical examination given by the Station Medical Department.
