

The purposes of the proposal are 1) to help the services meet their urgent requirements for top-notch career people in officer, warrant and enlisted ranks, and 2) to reward career people at all echelons who have initiative and ability to qualify for increased respon-

It is the Defense Department's objective to insure dedicated career personnel that their compensation will be vacancies in various Federal agensufficient to enable them to discharge their responsibilities cies in Southern California. to both their country and their families. The new payincentive proposal will attain that objective.

The plan grows out of the Cordiner Committee's recommendations for sweeping changes in our military pay structure. The Cordiner Committee, after a year's work that included personal interviews with, hundreds of service members, called the present system outdated.

The proposal now before Congress would provide higher rewards for individual contributions. It would establish two new pay grades for enlisted men and two for officers. It would make possible raises of at least six per cent to seven of every 10 persons in the Armed Forces.

Above all, it would increase the attractiveness of career service, and would keep high-caliber people in uniform.
