



Larger June paychecks became a reality for more than 2.5 million active and retired members of the Armed Forces when President Eisenhower signed into law the new military incentive bill last week.

Many provisions of the new legslation, signed by the President as Public Law 85-422, are based on the ecommendations of the Cordine committee to reduce manpowe turnover and to give the services reater selectivity in retention of

ighly qualified personnel. Grade E-8 advances will be lim ited to two per cent, and E-9 to one per cent, of the total enlisted strength of the Army, Navy, Marine Corps and Air Force. These promotions, however, will be phased in over a four-year period, the number being made annually depending upon the funds available.

A ceiling of 15 per cent of total strength also is placed on proficiency pay awards, which may be made by only one of the two methods described in the bill and will be regulated by the Office of the Secretary of Defense.

# VX-5 Pilot Escapes In Air Show Crash

A Station VX-5 pilot, LCdr. Larry Cauble, parachuted to safety when his A4D-2 Skyhawk flamed ou while executing an over-the-shoulder loft bombing maneuver before an estimated 8,000 people witnessing the air show at the Naval Air Station; Corpus Christi, Texas, on Tuesday this week.

Reporting by radio that the jet engine of his plane had quit, he aimed the craft for the Gulf of Mexico and ejected himself. Meantime, an NAS rescue helicopter hovering nearby was on hand to pick him up when he drifted down, unharmed. Cauble was flown back to the air how grandstand where 150 visiting members of the Aviation Writers Association of America and three admirals greeted him enthusiasti-

Emerging from the rescue helicopter dripping wet but smiling, Cauble said, "I had rolled over after releasing my payload when the engine quit. There wasn't much else to do but get out of there. I'm all right, but I'm a little nervous right this minute."

A.few seconds before his airplane gave him trouble, Cauble had giver the crowd the biggest thrill up to that point by lofting a simulated A-bomb from several thousand fee: in the air and dropping it within yards from the target-the hull of a surplus PBM flying boat.



#### Memorial or Memorable Day

• While driving, remember that California's speed limit is 55 miles per hour, and even less under certain conditions. Of course there will be a number of "good drivers" pass you as they take a short cut to eternity. Don't let it worry you. The important thing . is to get there-not just to get there fast. ----


