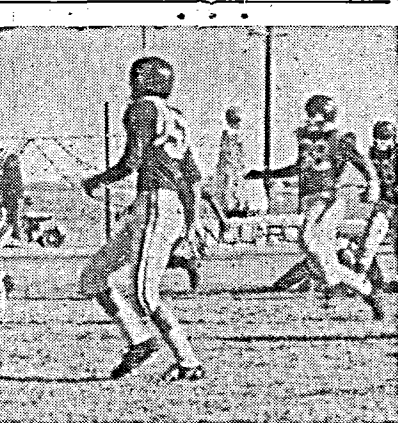

Chief Quarterman Exam To Be Given

Applications postmarked not later than November 19 will be accepted for a Navy competitive promotional examination for the position of Chief Quarterman (public works) for employment at the U.S. Naval Auxiliary Air Station, Fallon, Nevada.

Applications will be accepted only from career or career-conditional employees of U.S. Naval establishments within the 12th U. S. Civil Service Region.

All applicants, subsequent to attaining journeyman status in an appropriate trade, must have had successful and satisfactory experience which meets the requirements listed in the examination announcement number 3 (IVA) (58).

Standard Form 57 must be filed with the Industrial Relations Officer, U.S. Naval Auxiliary Air Station, Fallon, Nevada, not later than the close of business on November 19. Applicants must clearly indicate on their application form the title of the examination and the announcement number.

New Rules Formulated Concerning Work Quality of Burroughs High School Pupils

In accordance with the District ruling, the faculty committee of Burroughs High School has drawn up a plan whereby there will be closer coordination between teacher, counselor, student and parents in those cases where there appears to be danger of a student failing.

Mrs. Charles Bernard presided over the business meeting at which the following officers were elected for the coming year; President, Mrs. Marguerite M. Rogers, St. Michael's Episcopal; Vice-president, Mrs. Charles Bernard, Ridgecrest Community Methodist; Secretary, Mrs. Anne F. Carter, St. Michael's Episcopal; Treasurer, Mrs. Roy Pullen, NOTS Community Church.

Mrs. Robert B. Allen, NOTS Community Church, who was general chairman for the entire program, reports that the offering of \$71.40 will go to the national fund for extending Christian service throughout the world. The large collection of yarns and yardage will be shipped to the South Sea Islands, Pakistan, and to countries where refugees await resettlement, enabling women there to knit and sew garments for their families.

Mrs. Bernard announced that the annual meeting of United Church Women will be held on January 9, 1959.

The rules established by the Burroughs committee are:

1. If a student receives three or more failing grades at the close of the first six-weeks grading period of a semester, a parent conference must be held to explain the District directive to the parents and to explore possibilities of correcting the student's activity so that a passing grade may be received.

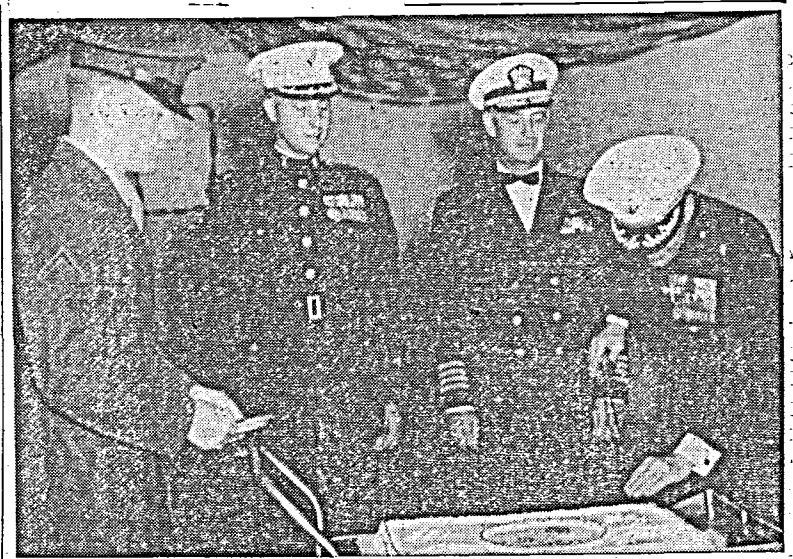
2. If the student receives failing grades in any three courses at the end of the second six-weeks period, he will be placed on probation for the remainder of the semester. A second parent conference is required.

3. If at the close of the probationary period, the student is still failing in three or more classes, the following action will be taken:

a. If the student is 16 or older, he will be excluded from the high school for at least one semester. Provisional readmittance will be granted on a probationary status for one semester after the absence of one semester. Grades must be passing at all times after readmittance.

b. If the student is under 16, he will be referred to the Kern County Juvenile Court, through the County Probation Department as "being out of control." This student shall remain suspended from Burroughs on consecutive two-week suspensions until the Court disposes of his case. If the Court so recommends, this student must be readmitted to school on a probationary basis, with the approval of the school authorities, for the remainder of the semester. If, during the second probationary period, the student does not meet the terms of the probation, he will be referred again to the Court, and suspended until court action is taken. If such court action would not include the release of the student from the school, his case would be referred to the Board of Trustees with recommendation of expulsion.

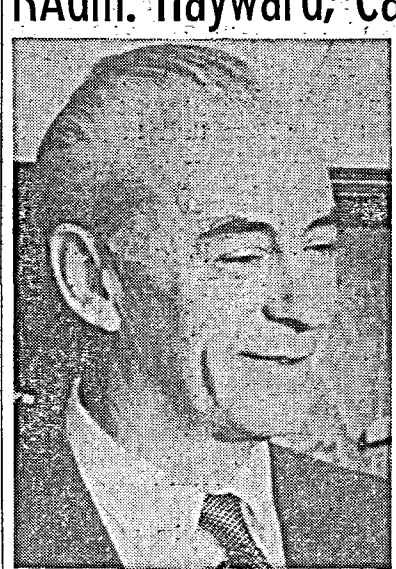
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Thompson Awards Conferred Today at Advisory Board Meeting

Seven members of the ten-man Advisory Board of the Naval Ordnance Test Station, each one a recognized expert in his respective field, arrived yesterday and Wednesday for the annual Board visit to the Station, as did Capt. F. L. Ashworth, one of the three men chosen to receive L. T. E. Thompson awards.

Established in 1948, the Advisory Board is basically a consulting and liaison team with wide technical and administrative experience and training.

RAdm. Hayward served during 1944-47 as Experimental Officer and is now assigned as Assistant Chief of Naval Operations for Research and Development.

Howard A. Wilcox, Head, Weapons Development Department, "for his signal enthusiasm, his diversified scientific skills, his original interdisciplinary thinking, and his ability to elicit the best from others, whereby he has overcome a series of formidable technical and administrative problems in the Station's research and development work," will receive the medal and certificate composing the Award.

Members of the NOTS Advisory Board who are on the Station area: Dr. L. T. E. Thompson, Robert L. Biggers, President, Fargo Division of Chrysler Corporation, Detroit, Michigan; Dr. John G. Cope, Assistant General Manager, Richmond Laboratory, California Research Corporation at Richmond, California; Dr. Charles C. Lauritsen, Professor of Physics, California Institute of Technology, Pasadena; RAdm. A. L. McKee, USN (Ret), Vice President of Fleet, thereby successfully integrating operational considerations and original research, and for advancing the Station through his interest in and enthusiasm for community affairs.

Presentation of the awards will be made at today's Board luncheon. The L. T. E. Thompson Award was established by the Station Commander in 1956 as NOTS' highest recognition for exemplary individual achievement. With this Award, the Station perpetuates the vision, leadership and persistent effort of Dr. Thompson, first technical director, from 1945-51, now an Advisory Board member and Consultant to United Aircraft Corporation, Norden Division, White Plains, New York.

The Award, consisting of a medal and a certificate, is made to both civilian and military personnel for outstanding contributions to the advancement of ordnance, fulfilling the mission of the Naval Ordnance Test Station, and thus, of the forces of the U. S. Navy. Final selection for award of those nominated is made by the Station Commander upon recommendation of an advisory panel appointed by him.

Comments Capt. F. L. Ashworth, USN, now serving as Director, Atomic Energy Division, Office of the Chief of Naval Operations, will receive the Thompson Award "for integrating the technical, administrative, and support groups into a team dedicated to fulfilling the Station's mission, and, during his tenure as the Station's seventh Commanding Officer, creating widespread interest in the potential of this research and development activity, thereby brilliantly advancing the Station's prestige and upholding its mission."

Capt. Ashworth will accept the Award to be presented to RAdm. John T. Hayward, USN, "for his outstanding leadership and guidance as the Station's Experimental Officer in increasing the sensitivity of the Station to the needs of the Fleet, thereby successfully integrating operational considerations and original research, and for advancing the Station through his interest in and enthusiasm for community affairs."

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Capt. H. B. Hahn Assumes Duties Of Executive Officer This Week

Captain Harry B. Hahn officially assumed the duties of Station Executive Officer last Monday. He relieved Captain Guy F. Anderson who has held the position since Capt. F. A. Chenault was transferred to the USS MATHEWS (AKA 96).

Capt. Hahn came here following duty as Commanding Officer of the U. S. S. GREAT SITKEN (AE 17), a New York born, he comes from Alexandria, Va., his home town. He received his early education at New York's St. John Prep and Leonard Prep schools and attended Columbia University before his appointment to the U. S. Naval Academy.

On graduation from the Academy in 1937, he was assigned to the USS NEW ORLEANS, serving aboard her until December, 1942, and was then transferred to the Bureau of Personnel. After a short tour with BuPers he returned to the Academy Post Graduate School, then to the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, receiving his Masters Degree in Electrical Engineering in 1945.

Hahn's next three assignments were as gunnery officer aboard the USS COLUMBIA, USS MIDWAY, and USS MISSISSIPPI. Following these tours he was assigned to Navy Special Weapons Unit 1233 as C.O. from March, 1949, to May, 1950.

His next duty station was Sandia Base, New Mexico, as Operations Officer of the 8460th Special Weapons Group and as Commanding Officer of the Special Weapons Unit Training Group until April, 1952.

In August, 1952, he was given command of the USS TRATHEN, commanding her until his assignment to the Atomic Energy Commission in October, 1954.

Following his 3-year tour with AEC he served as C.O. of the USS GREAT SITKEN.

His decorations include the following: American Defense; Pacific-Asiatic, with five stars; American Campaign; World War II Victory; European Occupation; Korean Campaign, with two stars; and the United Nation Korean Medal. He married Janet Cuneen, of Washington, D.C., in 1941.

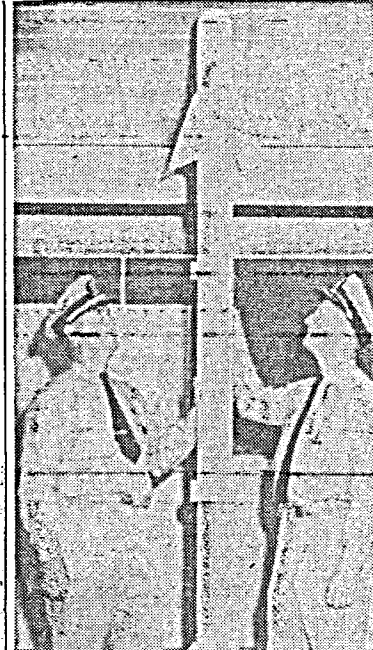

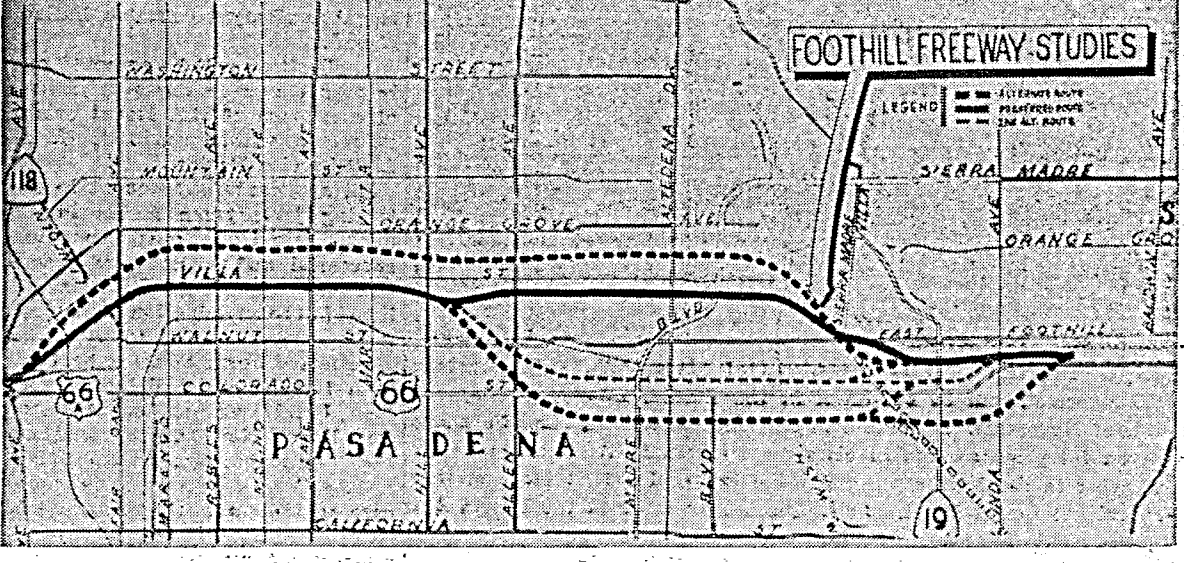

Four routes for the proposed Foothill Freeway have been under consideration for some time. Latest word from the District Office, Division of Highways, is that all necessary public meetings have been held and the matter is now between the Highway Commission and city authorities.

No indication was given when the announcement would come of the route selected. None of the proposed routes will affect the present Foothill location of NOTS.

Though state engineers decline to say which of the four routes is preferred by the state, their figures seem to indicate that the route which would return the most value to the taxpayer over a twenty-year period would be a route running from the Colorado Street bridge to within 200 feet south of Villa Street, then east to Eaton Wash, southeast to the Santa Fe tracks, and east again just north of the tracks to beyond Michillinda Avenue. This route is indicated by the solid black line on the above map.
