There is a logical reason for the 4 a.m. shift. Although they may be bit sleepy, they are on duty durng the coolest, most pleasant porion of the day-and they're through at 12:30-the hottest time of the day.

The gardening crew's "garden," approximately 350,000 square yards of greenery, include the maintenance chores of fertilizing, replanting, trimming shrubs, mowing lawns, and, of course-watering. In order to protect the Govern-
