Tomorrow's parade will feature a Navy and a Marine marching unit from the Station, the Marine Barracks' Color Guard, all from the Station, and the Marine Band from El Toro. There will be floats and motorized entries, including the heavy-duty equipment entered in Division 5 by the Naval Reserve Construction Battalion, 11-2.

An MB-1 Crash-Rescue Fire truck will participate, manned by the chief, a driver and five military personnel from the Naval Air Facility and will comprise Division 2 of the column which will move from the intersection of Norma Street and Ridgecrest Boulevard, turning onto China Lake Boulevard and disbanding at the intersection of Inyokern Road and China Lake Boulevard.

The Burroughs High School band will make its initial appearance of the year. The Band and a marching unit from the Civil Air Patrol Inyokern Composite Squadron 82 will make up Division 1.

Grand Marshal Walter Stiern, State Senator from the 34th Senatorial District, will act as Grand Marshal, and the Desert Empire's "Our Fair Lady," Marge Lyons, from Ridgecrest, will lead the procession. A number of mounted entries are expected.



NOTS Develops TERASCA High Altitude Research Missile Climbs 110 Miles Into Space

The Navy announced last week that TERASCA, a three-stage "off-the-shelf" high altitude research missile, was launched 110 miles into space from ranges of the U.S. Naval Pacific Missile Range, Pt. Mugu, California, last June

The concept of the missile was originated by Eugene Rutkowski and Wayne Howard of the Propulsion Development Department last February. Following the presentation of their idea to F. M. Fulton, Head of the Department, its feasibility met with approval and Fulton subsequently received Technical Director Dr. Wm. B. McLean's endorsement to proceed with the experiment.

Dennis Haluza was appointed project engineer, and he, n turn, headed a crew of technicians and engineers from the Missile Propulsion and the Propulsions Systems Divisions to work on the missile's development.

Following two diagnostic firings in April, the June firng was the first application of TERASCA in its present form, when the 2200 pound, 30-foot missile took off at an angle of 75° from horizontal in an orange flame, headng 220° (southwesterly direction) over the Pacific Ocean.

Three rocket motors were taken "off the shelf" here and combined into a simple air frame and tested successfully in less than two months time from the program start. The entire project cost less than \$20,000.

Unique in Economy

"This is an astoundingly small cost in time and effort compared to any other known work in space research," says Douglas D. Ordahl, head of the Missile Propulsion Division at NOTS.

Accelerating to a maximum velocity of 5,000 mph, TERASCA reached its summit 110 miles down range in three minutes, 44 seconds, (224 seconds) after launching. Impact of the payload occurred 240 miles at sea, in seven

minutes, 25 seconds after launching. The missile's 28.5 lb. payload was intended for trackng purposes only, reporting acceleration, trajectory and spin rate. Its prime value is an inexpensive, readily avail-

able vehicle for high altitude studies. Future firings may include TV scanning devices and atmospheric study instruments.

Name Derived from Three Missiles

The first stage motor is part of TERRIER, Navy's surface-to-air missile arming the guided missile cruisers USS BOSTON and USS CANBERRA. TERASCA can be fired from a Terrier launching pad. The second and third stages were borrowed from ASROC and CAJUN. ASROC is an anti-sumbarine weapon. CAJUN is a rocket motor develweapons development activity will Grantham. > "This research will ultimately provide the information necessary to design and develop practical instrumented satellites for such significant objectives as greatly improved weather predictions and world communications.

> "The major part of at least the early research for these applications can be accomplished expeditiously, simply, and at a very low cost if extensive use is made of reliable rocket engines already in existence," Ordahl said. "TER-ASCA has proven this economy concept."

Films of the TERASCA tests are being shown by Dennis Haluza this week in Washington to officials of BuOrd, NASA, BuAer, ARPA, and ONR.
