The Commissary will be closed for inventory beginning Tuesday, March 29, at 12 noon and will reopen Thursday, March 31, at 10 a.m.

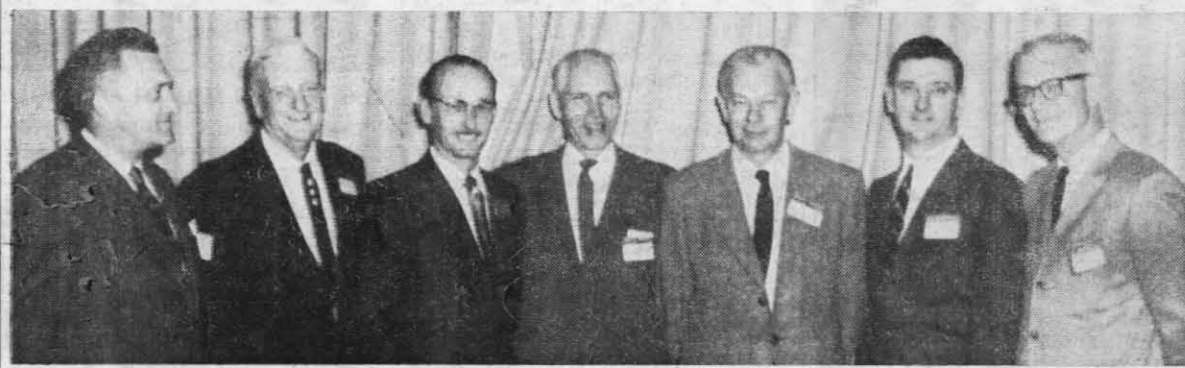

out to count 180 million people in the U. S. on April 1, enumerators or census takers in the China Lake-Ridgecrest area will have been recruited and trained by crew leader Rose Dorsey, 327 Haloid Street, Ridgecrest, phone 83901.

Persons interested in working as enumerators should call Mrs. Dorsey for an appointment to take the required examination before April 1. Enumerators will be paid on a 48-hour week basis during the approximate three weeks of employment.

Census Takers Qualifications Applicants for enumerator's examination must be: a U. S. citizen; a high school graduate 18 years of age or over; demonstrate ability to understand written instructions and read maps; be of high moral character; conduct interviews in a clear, concise manner; have good eyesight; be in good physical condition and walk, stand, and drive properly; and be able to read and write neatly and legibly. Four one-half days of training will start next Monday, March 28.

All military and civilian personnel living in Station housing will be contacted by the enumerators.

Lcdr. F. E. Johnson, Commanding Officer of NOTS enlisted personnel, has been appointed to coordinate the census taking of all single military personnel living in barracks at NOTS China Lake and Pasadena. AOD Open House Draws Large Crowd

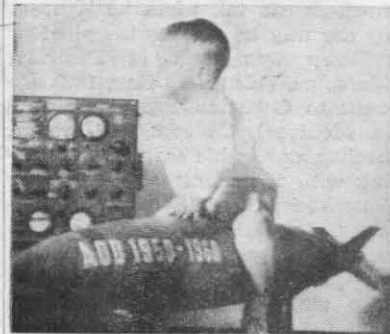
Approximately 400 persons attended the Aviation Ordnance Department Open House held last Saturday at Armitage Field.

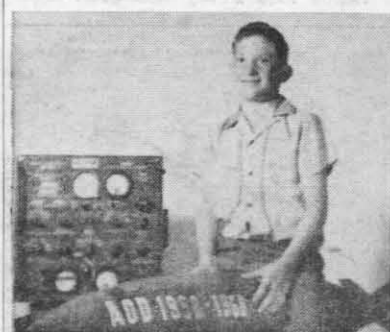

Mel Creusere, chairman, felt that the combined efforts of AOD personnel were well rewarded.

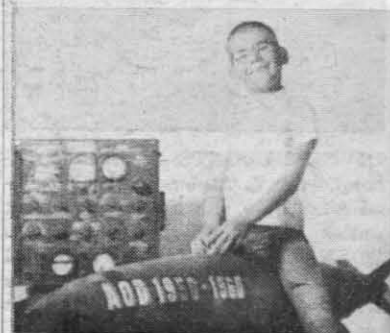

This is the first time China Lake has been represented in the District and State Bands.

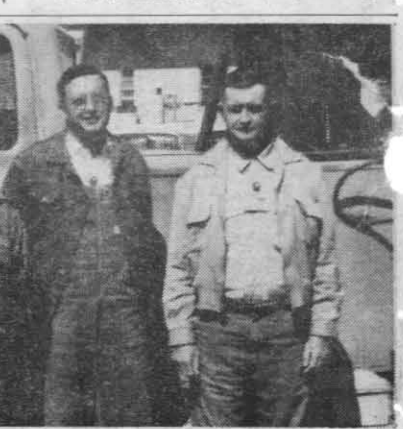
Personal Property Tax Consultant Now Available

Former Station C. O. RAdmiral Vieweg, Dies

Rear Admiral Walter V. R. Vieweg, USN, (Ret), former Station Commander of NOTS from September, 1949, until October, 1952, died following a brief illness due to a kidney infection last Sunday, March 20, at Bethesda Naval Hospital, Bethesda, Md.

Funeral services were held at 11 a.m. last Wednesday at Fort Myer, Va., followed by interment at the Arlington National Cemetery. The survivors, Mrs. Anne Vieweg and their two sons, Victor and Richard, live at 1111 Army-Navy Drive, Riverdale, Md.

He was born in Buffalo, New York, September 19, 1902. Graduated from the U. S. Naval Academy as an ensign in 1924, he served aboard ship until he entered flight training at Pensacola and was designated a naval aviator in 1926.

Service followed in various squadrons until he went to the Bureau of Ordnance in 1941 to serve as chief of the Aviation Ordnance Section. For this work, he received a citation authorizing him to wear the Commendation Ribbon. He later was awarded the Navy Cross for action in the Palau and Leyte invasions in 1944.

The next shore duty was with the Bureau of Aeronautics in 1945. He was senior member of the board which selected Pt. Mugu as the site of the Bureau's guided missile test station. In 1946, he became commanding officer of the U. S. Naval Aviation Ordnance Test Station, Chincoteague, Va. He went to the carrier USS Kearsarge in 1947, then came here.

His oldest son Victor graduated from Burroughs High School in 1952, and Richard was a junior at Burroughs when they left NOTS. Vieweg School, one of the China Lake elementary schools at NOTS which was dedicated in January, 1953, was named in his honor.

Temianka To Conduct Final Concert of Season

The "Temianka Little Symphony" under the direction of Henry Temianka, will be the last NOTS Civic Concert of the 1959-60 season on Tuesday, April 5, at 8:15 p.m. in the Station Theatre.

Henry Temianka, conductor and violin soloist of his Little Symphony of eighteen virtuoso performers, achieves a unity and spontaneity of interpretations rarely heard outside of a string quartet. His group's delightful orchestration ranges from a body of thirteen strings to an able percussion section to flute, piccolo, clarinet and saxophone.

Included among the outstanding young soloists from all over the United States are featured artists William Corbett Jones and Sylvia Jenkins, duo-pianists.

Temianka's program spans the musical spectrum from Bach's Brandenburg Concerto to Copeland's Clarinet Concerto and, as a piece de resistance, Saint-Saen's irrepresible and fascinating Carnival of Animals.

As a violin soloist Henry Temianka is superb. "His playing of the Beethoven violin concerto with the Pittsburgh Symphony in Syria Mosque was a shining example of aristocratic artistry," reports Ralph Lewando, Pittsburgh Press. "All of Mr. Temianka's solo playing was exquisite, and one can understand the tremendous ovation he received at the concert's conclusion which recalled him five times," he said.

Be Counted 1960 Census To Start April 1

Ten years of population change in California will be measured with the beginning of the 18th Decennial Census of the United States next Friday, April 1, by the Bureau of Census, Department of Commerce, Washington, D. C.

This year, because of a new method of taking the Census, there is a particular need to inform the public. For the first time, a questionnaire with complete instructions to the recipient will be mailed to all homes. This questionnaire, filled out in advance, will cut each census taker's call time and get the big job done faster.

The 1960 Census of Population and Housing will bring forward the information last collected in the 1950 Census. The final statistics will be one of the Nation's vital tools for quick and accurate planning of new and improved facilities for education, medicine, science, housing, transportation, defense—and for keeping America strong and alert.

Be Sure You're Counted Our representation in Congress for the next ten years will be based on the 1960 count. The amazing growth and shift of the population since our last Census is expected to produce many changes in the makeup of the House of Representatives, some states will lose and some states, of course, will remain unchanged. Every citizen's count will help his state get its fair share of Representatives.

British Aircraft Undergoes Seat Ejection Tests Here

British-American good will was more firmly cemented this week as a nine-member British test team and Track Division personnel successfully completed seat ejection tests at SNORT Track of her Majesty's Royal Navy's latest jet aircraft, the Blackburn NA. 39.

An international flavor was also added as 24 graduate students from CalTech, representing 12 foreign countries, witnessed the successful test of a British product on an American track.

Comprising the 9-man test team here is Blair McDonald, Blackburn Aircraft's project engineer for the tests. He is a graduate of the Royal Technical College, Glasgow, Scotland.

Heading up the military contingent of the team is veteran test pilot Cdr. Orr, who has eliminated the "bugs" from over 100 aircraft for the British Navy during his 21-year Navy career. Covering the medical aspects of the tests is LCdr. John Rawlins of the Ministry's Institute of Aviation Medicine.

NOTS A Natural In answer to why NOTS was selected for their tests, Cdr. Orr, replied, "It was a natural—British Navy aircraft being tested at a Navy Station with Navy personnel." Asked if there were tracks available for such testing in Great Britain, Cdr. Orr said, "No, but the British government plans to build a track in the future."

Ministry of Aviation Civil Service employees with the group are John White, principal scientific officer, and Lionel Jenkins, senior experimental officer. Jenkins had high praise for Track Division personnel, citing their "know how" and cooperation as outstanding. He further added that the NA. 39 will be one of the most extensively tested of all British aircraft when the seat ejection tests are completed.

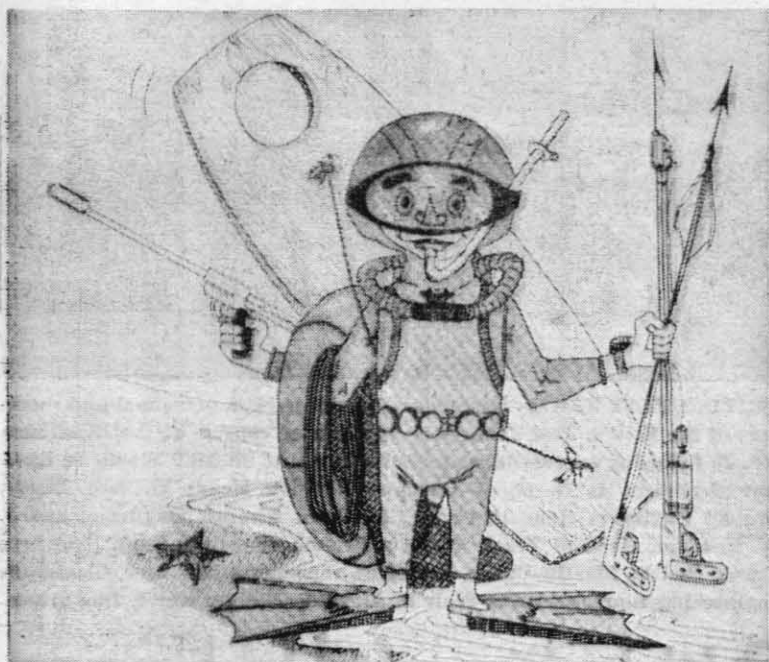

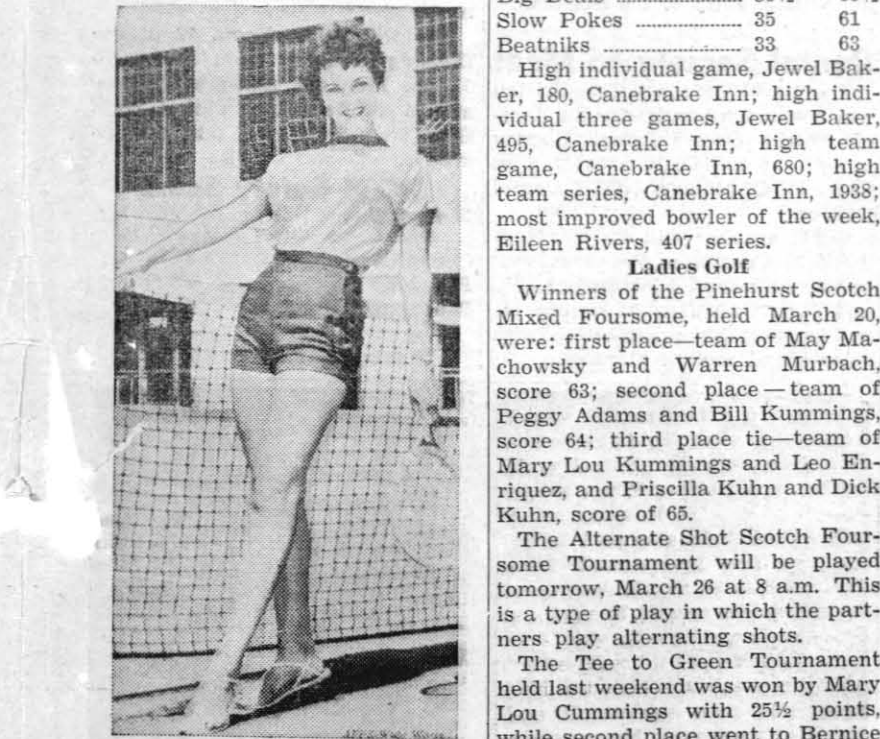
