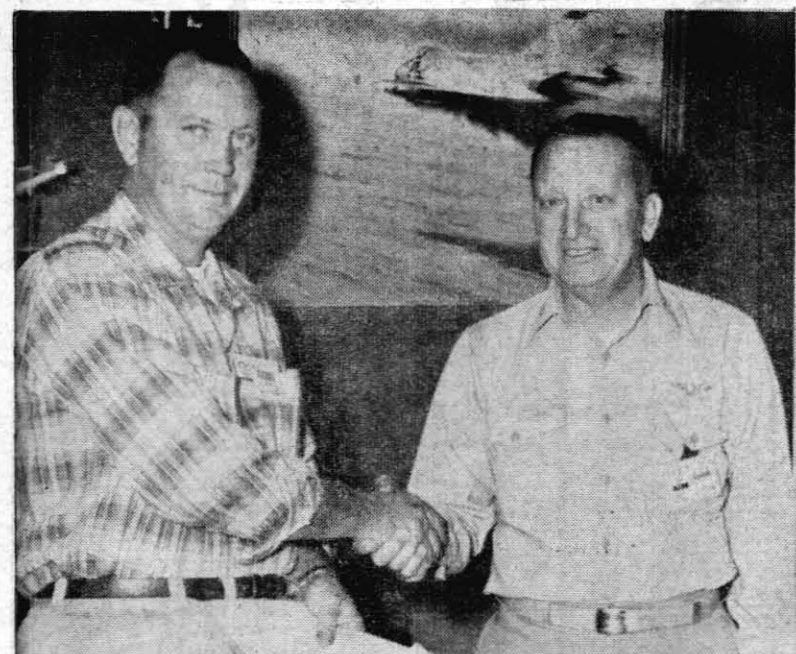

China Lake CAP Squadron To Conduct Search for Planes

Tuesday night, all personnel of China Lake Civil Air Patrol Squadron 84 were briefed by Capt. Wilbur Hamilton on the ground and air search to be conducted this Saturday and Sunday in an effort to locate four missing aircraft with 13 persons aboard.

The search ordered by the CAP California Wing will take in the High Sierra, the mountains around Tehachapi and San Bernardino, as well as the intervening foothill and valley areas and the coastal mountain ranges.

Search Headquarters will be at Meadows Field in Bakersfield for the lighter aircraft that will concentrate their efforts in the lower altitude areas.

Red Cross Appeals For Chilean Relief

Red Cross Chapters across the nation are acting as agents to accept cash contributions for relief of earthquake victims in Chile, upon an appeal by the Chilean Red Cross for international assistance.

Soon after the report of death, missing, and homeless was released, the Red Cross immediately advanced \$10,000 and provided the services of a disaster team.

Communications are now open and persons anxious about the well-being of their friends and relatives in the disaster area may cable welfare inquiries regarding Chilean nationals directly to the Chilean Embassy in Washington, D. C.

ROCKETEER Twenty-Two Graduated From Apprentice Program

Twenty of the 22 graduating apprentices were present to receive their certificates of completion of the four-year apprentice training program at ceremonies held in the Community Center last Friday.

In addition to achieving journeyman status in their respective crafts the graduates were awarded Associate in Arts degrees from Bakersfield Junior College.

This was the tenth class to graduate since the establishment of the apprentice training program at NOTS in 1948 and the 88th year since the establishment of the apprentice program by the Navy.

Principal Speaker Captain W. W. Hollister, Station Commander, delivered the principal address, devoting his remarks to the purpose, principles, procedures and benefits of the apprentice program.

In the course of his speech, Capt. Hollister noted that between 1940 and 1950 alone, the use of skilled individuals increased approximately 40 per cent.

"The man who has an apprentice acquired skill is a person who can advance rapidly, not only as a result of better training, but also because of greater interest in his craft," Capt. Hollister said, attributing the quote to Joseph T. Davis, formerly of the Navy's Office of Industrial Relations.

"The skills acquired through apprentice programs has enabled industry as well as our Naval Laboratories to fulfill their objectives in all kinds of research, development, and production work," Capt. Hollister told the group. "Thoroughly trained and skilled workers strengthens our ability to produce essential weapons and materials," he added.

Paul Stewart, who also won the school performance award for his class last year, will have his name engraved, along with the previous winners, on the award plaque, which will be displayed in the Training Building.

School Performance Awards - First year classman Richard Jeffery, Electronics Mechanic, second year classman Glenn Johnson, Electronics Mechanic, and third year classman Joseph Schaffer, Electrician, were the recipients of \$50 awards for outstanding scholarship, which were presented by Robert W. Anderson, Head, Personnel and Community Relations Department.

Apprentice Program - Last week's graduation marked the tenth consecutive year that NOTS employees have received journeyman status since 1948, when the training program that now concerns Apprentice Training was initiated. Since 1950, approximately 170 men have advanced to journeyman entirely through the Station's Apprentice Program.

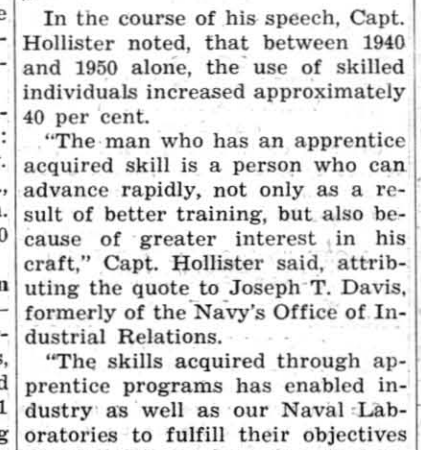

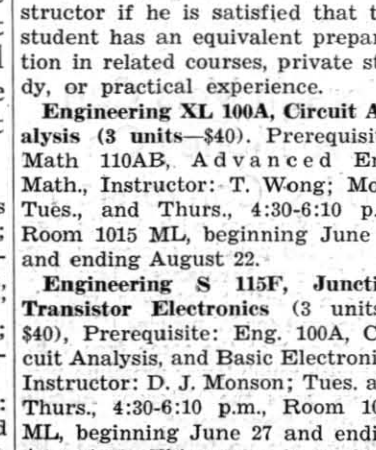

Don't look now but that fine print on the time payment contract you plan on signing may be a better job of camouflage than Armed Forces combat units are capable of creating.

Hardship to both civilian and military personnel has resulted from usury, fraud, misrepresentation, misunderstanding, and poor judgment. Interest rates as high as 40 to 62 percent have been charged to finance automobiles and other installment purchases.

"Come on" ads sound good to the starry-eyed who can see only the product they want. They include such gimmicks as "No Money Down," "Low Bank Rates," "No Carrying Charges," and "Name Your Own Terms."

The time payment plan has proven its usefulness from the Government level on down to the individual citizen and a large number of firms offer reputable plans. However, it pays to look before you leap.

Korean Vets Can Save Money On Policy Conversion

In accordance with Public Law 85-896, RS policies (Veterans Special Term Insurance), issued to Korean Conflict veterans, may be exchanged for W policies (Convertible Term) at the same face value but with much lower premium payments, says the Veterans Administration Department.

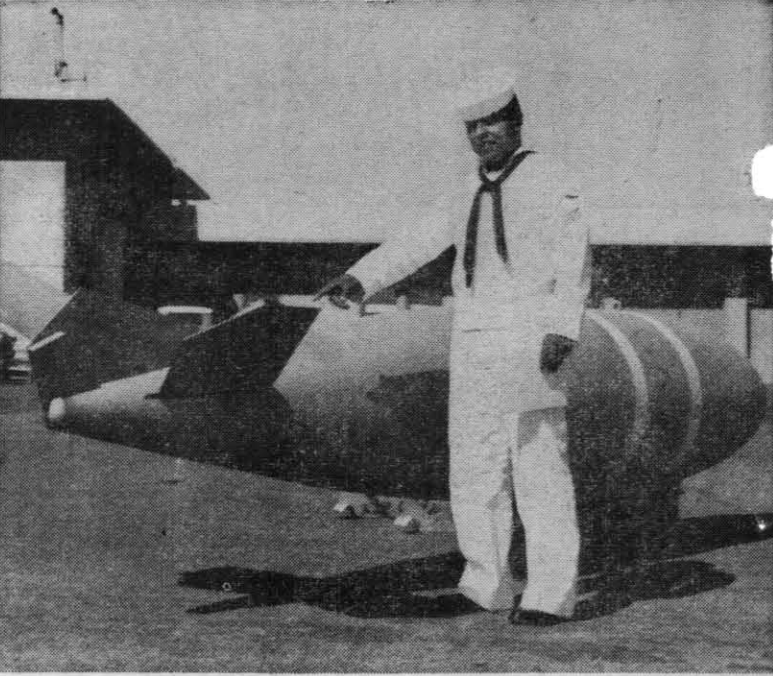
There are no "gimmicks" in the exchange; W insurance is cheaper because a more realistic mortality table is used. Under the USGLI and NSLI policies issued as participating insurance, policyholders receive a regular dividend as refund for the premium overcharge.

This cannot be done on RS contracts, as the law under which they were issued requires that they be nonparticipating. This resulted in surplus funds in the U. S. Treasury which cannot be returned. For this reason, the law was modified to allow the exchange of RS policies to a convertible term contract, based upon a new mortality table.

RS policyholders are encouraged to exchange their policies for the new W contracts, or to convert to one of the six permanent plans at the earliest possible opportunity.
