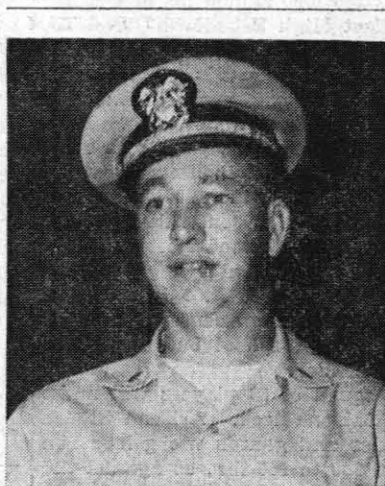

The 10th Annual Desert Empire Fair will open next Wednesday afternoon, September 21, about 4 p.m., continuing through Saturday evening, September 24, in Ridgecrest. Fair officials urge residents to wear Western apparel in line with the spirit of the event and this year's theme, "Sagebrush Saga."

A gala coronation banquet will be held tomorrow night at the Hide-away when the winning contestant and her two runners-up for the title "Our Fair Lady" will be announced. Station Commander Capt. W. W. Hollister will again officiate in the crowning of the winner of "Our Fair Lady" contest.

Cheryl Muns of Bakersfield, winner of the annual countywide beauty pageant, will be grand marshal of the 1960 Fair Parade set for Saturday, September 24, at 11 a.m. She will be flanked by two local girls, Dolores Burke and Pat Reid, two top runners-up in the county beauty pageant.

Forty clubs will man 64 booths under the Big Top, and 16 organizations will work booths on the Midway. Some of the China Lake clubs who will have game booths on the Midway are: CPO Wives, Community Council, American Federation of Government Employees, Supervisors Association, Navy Wives, St. Anne's Altar Society, Sweet Adelines, Apprentice Association, and Supply Department's Recreation Club.

Next Tuesday Marks Partial Solar Eclipse

Carroll Evans, president of the China Lake Astronomical Society, has announced that a solar telescope will be set up in front of the Station Theatre to facilitate public viewing of the partial eclipse of the sun. The event will take place Tuesday, September 20, starting at 4:17, maximum at 5, and will be complete at 5:43 p.m.

Weather permitting, the eclipse will be projected onto a screen enabling viewers to see not only the eclipse itself, but large sunspots as well.

This is the second and last solar eclipse of 1960. The first, which occurred last March, was not visible in the United States.

Washington NavNews Service announced that development of the missile system ASROC (antisubmarine rocket) has been boosted with another contract to the Minneapolis-Honeywell Regulator Co., bringing the total up to \$4,960,000.

NOTS To Participate In DOD Carrier Seminar

At a Joint Department of Defense Carrier Missile Transportation Seminar to be held September 20-23 at Fort Bliss, Texas, NOTS will have the responsibility of presenting the Navy's case in missiles and rockets.

The Bureau of Naval Weapons has requested this Station to name appropriate speakers, set up a suitable display, and prepare a brochure on naval weapons for the seminar.

Jesse A. Bell, Traffic Director of the Traffic Division in Supply Department, will be general coordinator for the Station's part in the seminar. Ray Sinnott, assisted by Byron Butler, both of the Presentations Division of the Technical Information Department, will man the displays. Both will accompany Bell to Texas.

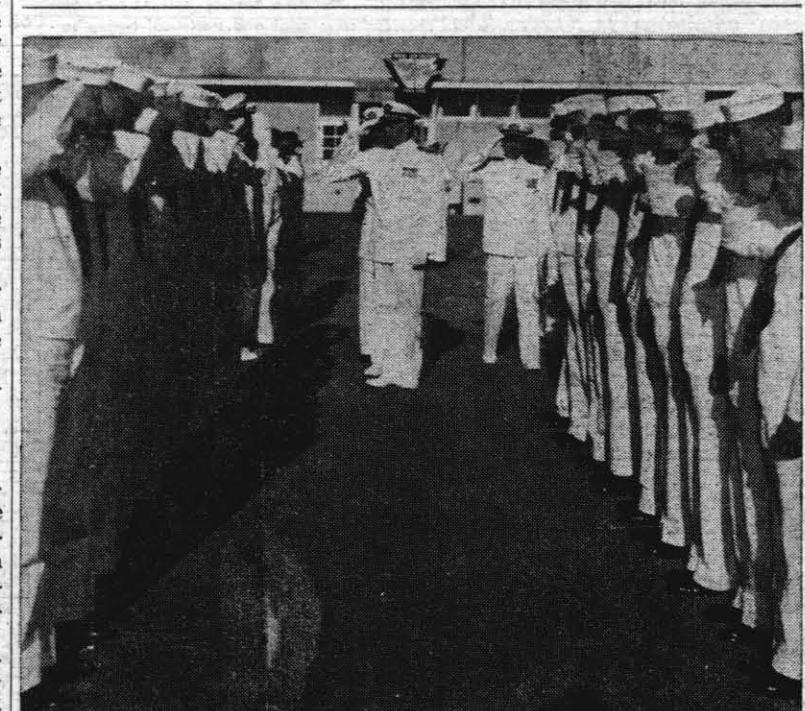
Two of the speakers for the event will represent NOTS and the Department of the Navy. Their topics will concern the manufacture and packaging hazards of handling and shipping solid propellants and high explosive warheads. The identity of the local speakers was unknown at press time.

Full scale models for display will include Mighty Mouse, Bullpup, Regulus, Sidewinder, Sparrow, Talos, Terrier, Zuni, and ASROC. Mighty Mouse and Zuni launchers will also be featured. A working model of Sidewinder will track infrared objects (a lighted cigarette will do). A ten-foot model of Polaris will simulate an underwater launching from a submarine.

A brochure on shipping and handling data for 13 Navy missiles has been prepared by the Publishing Division, TTD. Copies will be presented at the seminar to some 300 representatives of the armed services, missile-development organizations, transportation-regulatory bodies, commercial carriers, and freight-rate and freight-classification agencies.

Since much of the information essential to carriers appears for the first time in unclassified form, anyone who does not have clearance, yet is concerned with the safe handling, shipping, and storing of Navy missiles, rockets, and components, will find the book an indispensable aid.

An article on Pearson's contribution to metalworking research was printed in the September 9 issue of the Rocketeer.

Featured guest will be Isabelle Schultz Churchman of San Diego, a specialist in portrait busts of children.

At the age of 12, Mrs. Churchman decided to become a sculptress after viewing the works of the famous sculptor, Lorado Taft.

A native of Baltimore, Md., she studied at the Maryland Institute of Art, Goucher College, graduated from Columbia Teacher's College, and studied sculpture at the Rinehart School of Sculpture. She was awarded the first Rinehart Traveling Scholarship ever granted, and her travel award took her to England, Holland, Belgium, Germany, France and Italy.

She earned a first award in sculpture at the 1958 Fiesta Exhibition at San Diego. Among her commissioned sculptures permanently displayed are an Episcopal Bishop's portrait at the Pro Cathedral in Baltimore, a bust of Dr. John King in the Baltimore Medical Building, and the portrait of George Washington Carver in the Tuskegee Institute in Alabama. She also carved the wooden bas relief "Four Freedoms" panels in the War Memorial at the Russ Auditorium in San Diego.

Don't Miss the Boat—Let George Do It

"Let George do it" has become a familiar expression and means much the same in the military or civilian life... that George is a pretty dependable person. Unfortunately for the Navy George, it means that he frequently gets stuck with someone else's job.

We would be appalled if, during a football game, a fumbled ball squirted in front of a player who decided to "let George fall on it." Imagine how indignant we would be if the first doctor at the scene of an accident were to say "let Doctor George take care of it."

We look for and expect dependability in others around us and it is inconceivable to imagine a society without dependable people. In the Navy we know that the cooks can be depended upon at mealtime, that our pay accounts will be in order on payday, and that men on watch will warn us if danger threatens while we sleep or work at assigned tasks. This all contributes to our feeling of security. Unfortunately, there are times when this is a one-way street, when someone does not pull his share of the load.

When a man gains the reputation of being dependable, he is on the way up. His superiors, as well as the men under him, like to have him around. It gives them a feeling of reassurance.

The point to remember is that dependability is not a hereditary trait but an acquired one. It is not a gift for the favored few but is yours for the taking. This is mental grist you could well chew on before passing the buck to George!

Health Insurance Notes

The following is to clarify questions which have been raised concerning accident coverage under the Health Benefits Plan.

Accidental injuries under the Indemnity Benefit Plan are covered in the same way as sickness. This means that for outpatient care due to an accident, the \$50 deductible must be paid.

Under the Service Benefit Plan, carrier participation on accidental injuries is the same as for sickness in hospitalized cases. In outpatient cases due to accidental injury, the service rendered within the first 72 hours following the accident will gain carrier participation without payment of the \$100 deductible. After the 72-hour period, the \$100 deductible must be paid before further carrier participation is forthcoming.

From feedback received after two months of operation under the Government-wide Health Insurance Plans, it appears that a few misconceptions have arisen concerning the relationships between carrier, doctor or hospital and the enrollee. It is time we consider our relationship toward financial obligations which may or may not be covered by Health Insurance.

Health Insurance does not in any way negate your responsibility for payment of debts to doctors and hospitals. Health Insurance is a means of helping you meet these debts but does not in any way shift the responsibility for them from you to the carrier.

The hospital or doctor, in offering to submit your claim to the carrier, is performing a service for you. They have no obligation for doing this. They will submit only that part of the claim which they feel the policy calls for. If you do not feel that their interpretation of the policy is correct, your recourse is to submit your claim to the carrier, remembering that your responsibility for your debt exists regardless of the carrier's settlement.

Any contention between the enrollee and the carrier is to be settled strictly between that carrier and the enrollee.

Church Council Rep. To Lecture at NOTS

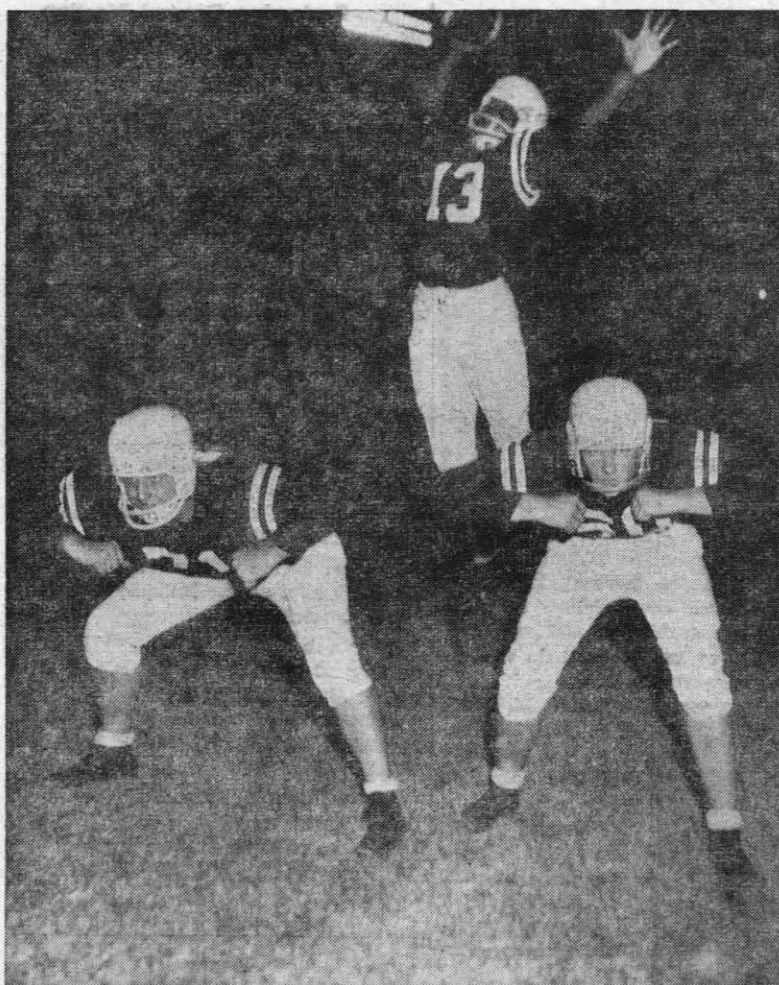

Heaviest men on the squad are Dave Wroblewski and Dennis Zekis, who will be the starting tackles. Wroblewski, 6 ft., 210 lbs., played for the Flatrock High School in Flatrock, Michigan. Zekis, 6 ft. 1 in., 200 lbs., gained his experience at East High School in Cleveland, Ohio.

Bob Rice and G. I. Malone will handle the guard positions. Rice, 5 ft. 10 in., 175 lbs., played for Heelan High School in Sioux City, Ia. Malone, 5 ft. 9 in., 160 lbs., played football at Davison, Mich., before entering the Armed Forces.
