#### Housekeeping Hints

Keep your oil mop in a metal container or in a well-ventilated place where it cannot catch fire spontaneously. Throw away oilsoaked rags.

Keep paint or varnish in tightly losed containers. Flammable fluids should never be used for cleaning. Gasoline should be kept in approved metal containeres in an outbuilding or the garage.

Keep your kitchen range broiler free from grease. If there is a window near the stove, make sure that the curtains do not blow over the burners.

#### **Maintenance Hints** When buying electrical equip-

nent, employ a qualified electrician o install it or extend wiring. Check appliances to make sure

wiring is not frayed or worn. Short circuits can cause fires. Provide sufficient electrical out-

lets to obviate the need for multiple attachment plugs and long extension cords.

Use only 15 amp fuses on all regular household lighting circuits. The purpose of a fuse is to blow if the circuit becomes overloaded. By using too large a fuse, or inserting penny behind a blown-out one. you are inviting trouble.
