Air-Launched Space Probe Scored by NOTSmen Project 'Hi - Hoe' Hurls Payload 1,000 Miles Up

Another "first" in space probes was scored by NOTS this Wednesday with the successful air launch of a two-stage Caleb rocket that thrust its 120-pound payload of scientific instruments 1,000 miles into space.

Charles M. Dye, Head of the Advanced Systems Branch, Weapons Development Department, termed the project "completely successful." He said further studies would be made on the telemetering results during the next few weeks.

Known as Project "Hi-Hoe," the launch was made at 8:40 a.m. Wednesday, high over the Pacific Missile Range from an F4H-II piloted by Lieutenant Al S. Newman of Naval Air Facility.

The actual launch was made from Lt. Newman's plane at about 38,000 feet, he said.



The Sandblaster

By JOHN M. HUGHES Just heard about a book which allegedly is an "expose" of public relations. When first published it sold as few copies as e author had friends.

Then the publishers hired a public relations firm and it became a best seller.

No vocational pursuit is so much maligned and so badly misunderstood as is the field of public relations. The fault lies chiefly with PR people. They're so wrapped up in promoting others that they've no time or desire to promote themselves.

As a result some ridiculous extremes have developed. At one end there's the notorious Los Angeles hood who blithely told a desk sergeant, while being booked on a murder charge, "I'm a public relations man." At the other extreme there's the Madison Avenue type who maintains that PR is the Alpha and Omega of all human activity.

In between there's a hardworking pedestrian group of PR men who quietly and efficiently perform as valuable service for their fellow-men as do practitioners of better-known professions.

The best definition of public relations comes from a man who's been titled "California Kingmaker" by the Saturday Evening Post. Herb Baus, the finest political public relations man in the business, gives an idea of the scope of PR in his explanation of what PR is: "Public relations is a combination of philosophy, sociology, economics, language, psychology, journalism, communication and other knowledges into a system of human understanding."

In the military there's as great, if not a greater, need for public relations than there is in many commercial areas. The military has a definite obligation to the public to keep it informed on matters vital to the nation's survival.

Engineers and facilities at NOTS have contributed, at the request of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, to the development of the one-man Project Mercury and the two-man Project Gemini capsules, the first two of the three planned spacecraft vehicles designed to take man to the moon. The third step will be the three-man Apollo lunar spacecraft.

Project Mercury, evolved under tremendous pressure four year ago, has become a valuable building block in the U.S. manned space flight program, and before it is completed, it will have become an extensive proving ground for the Gemini and Apollo programs.

Last summer, Bill Moore, General Engineer in Code 3071 of the Supersonic Track Division, Test Department, was the project engineer who coordinated tests on the separation mechanism between the Mercury booster motor and the capsule at SNORT range. A recovered capsule was used to conduct the tests.

Project Gemini, a second-generation spacecraft, will be used for a test bed for orbital rendezvous flights and for manned flights of a week or more late in 1964. It is an enlarged but far more complex version of the current Mercury capsule.

Both manned and unmanned ballistic flights will be attempted with the spacecraft in 1963 during its 12-flight program.

Experiments which would permit one of the two crewmen to leave the spacecraft while it is in orbit is being considered for this Project Gemini. A snubbing device is being developed that will hold the door open so an astronaut, attached to the capsule by an umbilical tube, would be able to operate outside his vehicle

A test program for Project Gemini, which is expected to continue until next year, is currently being coordinated by project engineer Mario Falbo, General Engineer in Code 3071.

The present program consists of testing the pilot ejection system under three different simulated conditions: off-thelaunch pad; in the atmosphere; and at re-entry.

Tests will be conducted in two phases: research and development; and qualification. Randsburg Wash tower facilities and the SNORT range will be used during both phases of testing.

Project Apollo, a third generation vehicle for earth-orbiting, will carry U.S. astronauts on circumlunar missions and a manned landing and return from the moon. The ambitious program predicts earth-orbital flights in 1965, circumlunar missions in 1966, and a manned lunar landing in that year or in 1967.

You can increase your retirement income by buying additional annuity through voluntary contributions; should you serve more than the time required to provide the 80 percent rate, leductions withheld thereafter will purchase additional annuity for you.

Your yearly basic annuity will be (a) 1.5 percent of your high-five" average salary times 5 years of service, plus (b) 1.75 percent of your "high-five" salary times years of service over 5 5 and up to 10, plus (c) 2 percent of your "high-five" salary times years of service over 10.

For example, an employee retiring at 62 after 25 years of service with a "high-five" average salary of \$5,000, would have his basic annuity figured this way

1.5 % x \$5,000 x 5	\$ 375.00	
1.75% x \$5,000 x 5	437.50	
2 % x \$5,000 x 15	1,500.00	
Yearly basic annuity (\$193 monthly)	\$2,312.50	

A substitute formula for figuring any part or all parts of the first formula may be used. It is 1 percent of the "high-five" average salary plus \$25 times years of service. This formula is used whenever it will produce a higher rate of annuity than any part [(a), (b), or (c)] of the first formula. Its use produces a higher rate of annuity only in the lower salary ranges.

A person retiring at 60 after 30 years of service with a "highfive" average salary of \$4,000, would have his basic annuity figured as follows: Notice that the substitute formula is used for the first 5-year period. That is because it is to the employee's advantage to do so.


