Talks With **Teenagers**

Steer clear of questionable places. It is a sad fact that probably no town in America does not have at least one place of questionable entertainment - a place you would not want your parents to see you in, and whose patrons usually have bad reputations of some kind.

It may be a dim, smoky roadhouse; a night club with storytellers, singers, and dancers you would not want your mother to see; or a juke box joint or drive-in patronized by boys and girls who are always in some kind of trouble. It may even be a movie house or place that specializes in showing films unfit for you and your date to see.

Some teen-agers get a thrill out of the forbidden. Put a place out of bounds and at once it is mighty attractive to those whose main charge seems to come from proving they do not have to conform to "old fogy" regulations.

Even if your crowd decides to go off the deep end you can remain firm to your ideals. Some youngsters climb a soap box and deliver a moral lecture. You don't have to. If someone suggests such a place of questionable reputation, you need only say you prefer someplace else. The others will respect you when you stand by your ideals and will know why you feel as you do.

Whenever teen-agers show up where they shouldn't be, it is almost certain that the girls in the crowd have not been on the ball. Girls should be in complete control on a date. And suppose the boy says he will never take a girl out again unless she goes to such a questionable place? It is her turn to say thanks. Any boy who insists on taking a girl where her reputation can be tarnished is no friend of hers, and the sooner she gets rid of him the better.
