Oregon Teachers Hold Aerospace Workshop

Forty Oregon elementary, high school, and college teachers added to their Aerospace IQ and knowledge of research and development work being conducted by the Station during an Aerospace Workshop here this week.

"Our visit to NOTS is one of the highlights of the workshop,"

stated Ray Hass, workshop director, following a lecture on the NOTS Weather Modification Program by James W. Baird of the Research Department.

"Each year on our visit here we gain new knowledge of your Station's work in research and development which aids our teachers to impart to their students a better understanding of this missile and space age," continued Hass.

This is the eighth consecutive year that Hass has brought the Oregon State-sponsored workshop to NOTS and his seventh consecutive year as its director.

The last week of the four-week workshop is comprised of visits to Boeing's Aerospace Division at Seattle, NOTS, Edwards Air Force Base, and Vandenberg Air Force Base.

"It was an eye opener," commented Dale Russell, a high school science teacher from Boring, Ore., after hearing a lecture on the Principles of Lasers by Richard S. Hughes of the Test Department's Photophysics Branch.

"I had no idea how extensive your work was here," exclaimed Iva Mae Sarbacher, an elementary teacher from Milwaukie, Ore., awed by the quick transition of a lecture on the Use of Satellites in Geodetic Measurements by Test Department's

Fred Ashbrook to the Underwater Moray Program by Weapons Development's Harry Bearman.

"Our visit has been most impressive," said Jeannette Ashlock referring to the Change of Command Ceremonies and the SNORT firing the group had witnessed. "... and we won't forget your community," the slack-clad teacher added as she wearily climbed on the bus for Edwards.

Pay Retroactive to July 5 for Civilians, Military Sept. 1

Legislation that will boost the pay of military, civil service and postal workers awaits President Johnson's signature following passage by both houses of Congress earlier in the week of two separate bills.

More than 1 million classified civil service employees will gain raises from 2.7 percent to 22.5 percent of their present salaries while some 600,000 postal employees stand to get average hikes of 5.6 percent.

2.5% Military Boost

The military pay bill, which is designed to boost incomes by 2.5 percent for all but enlisted personnel with less than two year's service, cleared Congress Monday of this week.

Commissioned and warrant officers with less than two years' service will get boosts of 8.5 percent under the new legislation, which represents the first raise in pay for men in this status in 12 years.

Dates Effective

The military pay boost was to become effective Sept. 1. The salary legislation for civil service, postal employees and other members of federal government is to be made retroactive to July 5, according to officials.

Capt. J. Hardy New ComNOTS

Captain John I. Hardy, former NOTS Experimental Officer and Commanding Officer until mid-July of the aircraft carrier USS Hornet, returned "home" this week to assume command here of the Navy's largest permanent weapons research and development station.

He succeeded Captain Leon Grabowsky as Commander of NOTS Tuesday morning as scores of military and civilians — many of them longtime friends — witnessed ceremonies held on the parade grounds adjacent to the Headquarters building.

Capt. Grabowsky resumed permanent duties as Station Executive Officer.

The formal change of command ceremonies followed a brief introductory address by Dr.

Wm. B. McLean, NOTS Technical Director.

Here From 1954-1957

Pointing to the duties the new NOTS Commander had performed on the Station from 1954 to 1957, Dr. McLean noted that Capt. Hardy's return to the Station marked the first time in twenty years that an officer previously assigned here returned to command the installation.

"It is with the greatest pleasure and expectation of a very successful tour that we welcome John and Dee (Capt. and Mrs. Hardy) to the Station." (Continued on Page 2)

Dr. Morse Completes First NOTS Visit

106 Acres Goes To Kern County

The proposed sale of 106 acres of China Lake land to Kern County was termed this week by Congressman Harlan Hagen as a "step forward to better County-Navy participation in a recreation development program," according to a message received here by Leroy Jackson, Head of the Community Relations Office.

The legislation, originated by Cong. Hagen, has passed both houses of Congress, but awaits amendments following a Senate approved version linked to price determination.

As originally submitted, the bill calls for sale of the property for approximately \$500, according to Cong. Hagen. The House passed this version and sent it on to the Senate where a determination of price by the Secretary of the Navy was called for.

"I am hopeful that I can make my version prevail in conference between the House and Senate. However, even if we are forced to accept the changed version, the Bill is a step forward." (Continued on Page 5)

Dr. Waugh Appointed To Cal Tech Faculty

Dr. John G. Waugh, Consultant in Physics in the Propulsion Division, Underwater Ordnance Department, has recently been appointed to the faculty of the California Institute of Technology as Senior Research Fellow in Engineering.

Dr. Waugh has been working with Professor Albert T. Ellis in establishing a research program sponsored by the Bureau of Naval Weapons on experimental and theoretical studies of forces acting on bodies during water exit.

The program on water exit studies is being conducted in the Hydrodynamics Laboratory at CalTech. A unique feature of these studies is the Variable-Atmosphere Wave Tank (shown below), which is 15 feet long, 2 feet wide and 4 feet high. It is made entirely of 2-inch thick lucite plastic. Electromagnetic missile propulsion systems are used for launching missiles and measuring missile hydrodynamic forces.

ing missile water-entry and exit models.

Since 1961, Dr. Waugh has been chairman of the Bureau of Naval Weapons Hydroballistics Advisory Committee (BOWHAC). This committee has as its primary responsibility that of providing the Bureau of Naval Weapons with the best available information and guidance for the conduct of its research and development programs concerning hydroballistics. It also arranges by meetings, publication, etc. for the exchange and distribution of information in the field of hydroballistics and provides for the correlation of the research and development work done at various facilities of, or working under contract with the Bureau of Naval Weapons, as well as with activities under the sponsorship of the Office of Naval Research, the Bureau of Ships, or other government agencies.



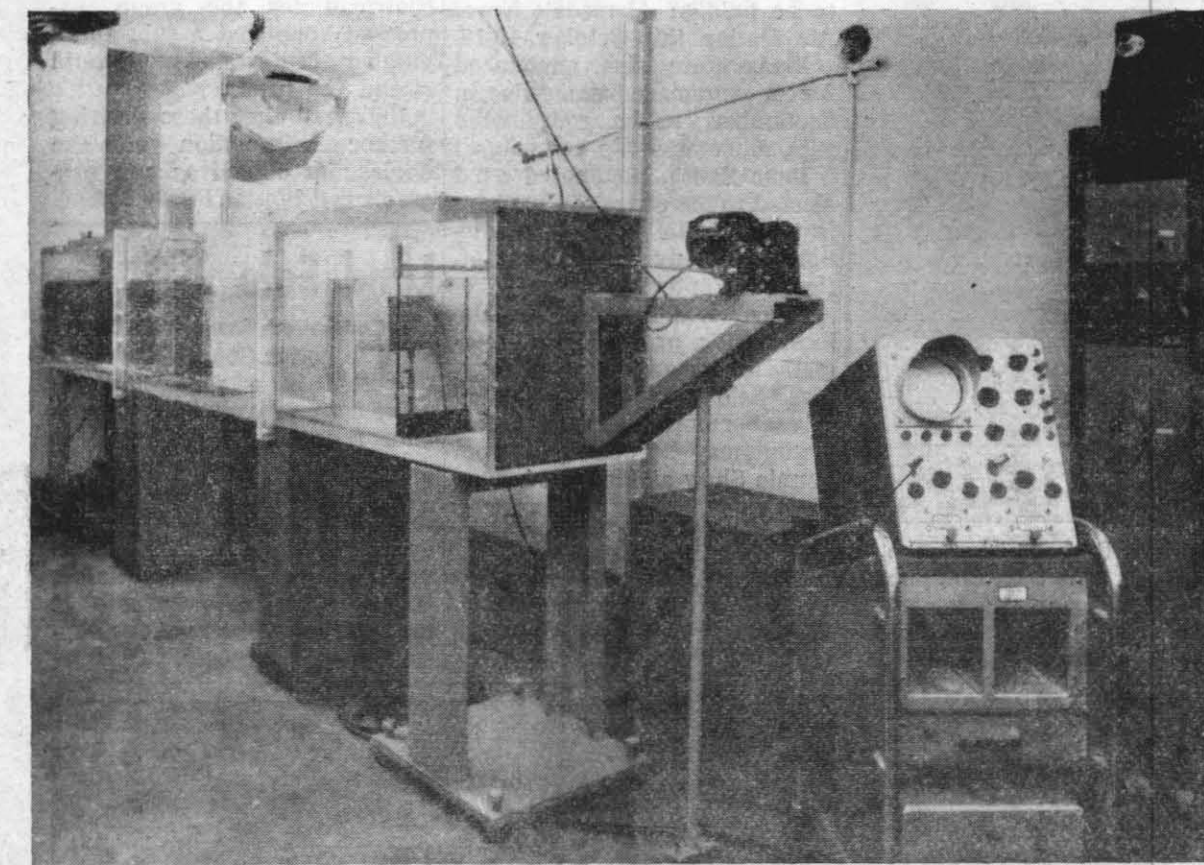
DR. JOHN G. WAUGH

Dr. Waugh resides with his wife, Mary Alice, and daughter, Mary Ruth 8, in Pasadena.

Originally from St. Louis, Missouri, Dr. Waugh received his BA and BS degrees in 1931 and the MA degree in 1932 from the University of Missouri. In 1935 he received his Ph.D. from Cornell University.

With his new doctorate, he was a physiologist in the U.S. Department of Agriculture. He joined CalTech in 1942 as a research staff member in physics, working on exterior ballistics of rockets.

He joined NOTS as a Physicist in 1945. His work at the station has been principally in hydroballistic research with emphasis on the problems associated with the water-entry and exit of missiles and the development of scaling techniques for model-

NOTS Credited With Another Sea Rescue

Answering a distress call from the Coast Guard last week on July 30, at 7:30 a.m., a Navy TRB11 was dispatched from San Clemente Island to the scene of a sinking fishing boat approximately one-half mile off Pyramid Head, the southeast tip of the island.

The stricken vessel, the 40-foot "St. Christopher," owned and skippered by Frank Kryda, and homeported in San Pedro, had been swamped by heavy seas, sprung a leak and lost

power. Also arriving on the scene to assist the TRB in rescue operations was the YPM 138, a tug from MINEPAC, Long Beach. The crew of the tug has been working in the vicinity, doing range surveillance for a shore bombardment group.

The two rescue boats pumped the water from the St. Christopher and repaired the generator. With further assistance from the Coast Guard cutter Cape Jellison, the crippled boat

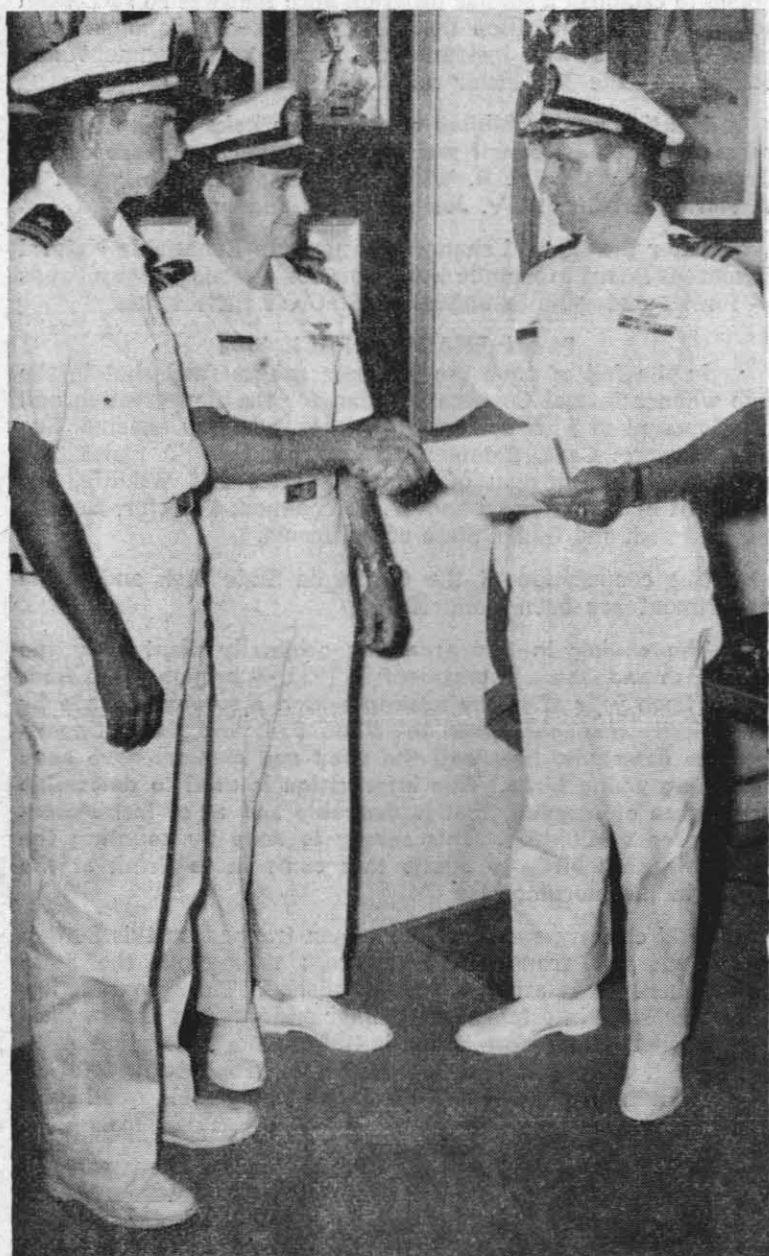

Lieutenant Morton M. Soifer (MC), a staff pediatrician, said this week that the record-sized baby is progressing "very nicely."

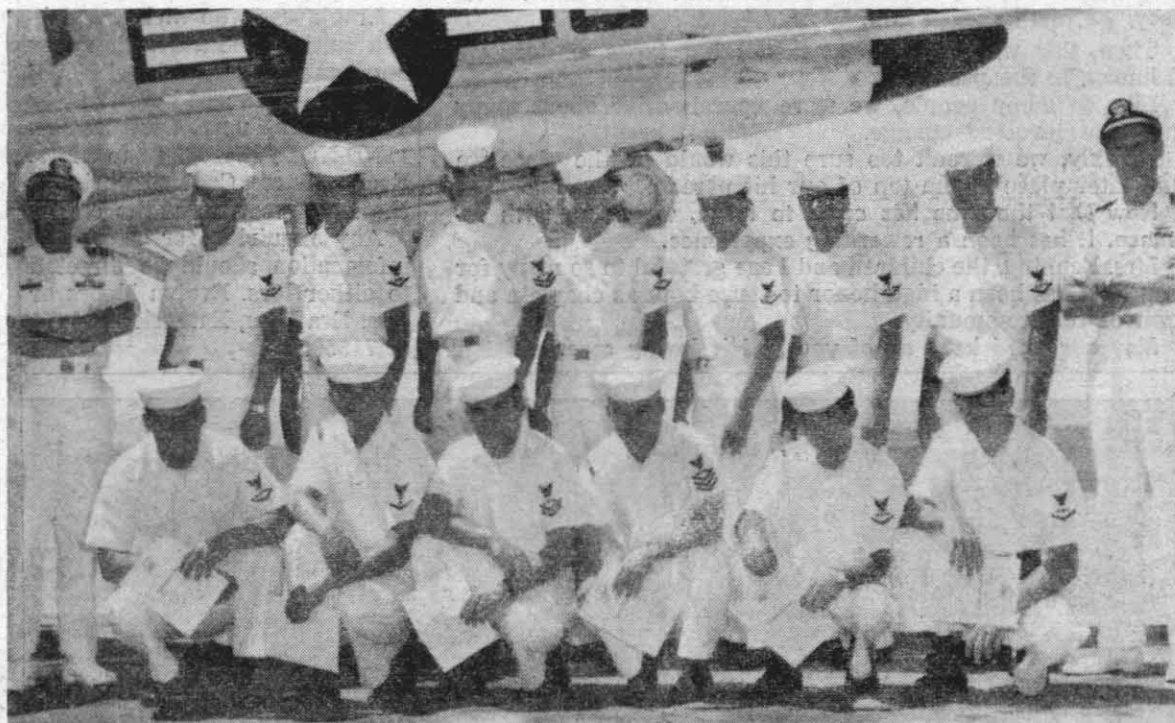
Thus far, Karin has been in the care of Mrs. Christine Hawkenson, a registered nurse with 14 years service on the local hospital staff.

commented Mrs. Hawkenson. How do the parents feel about their first-born?

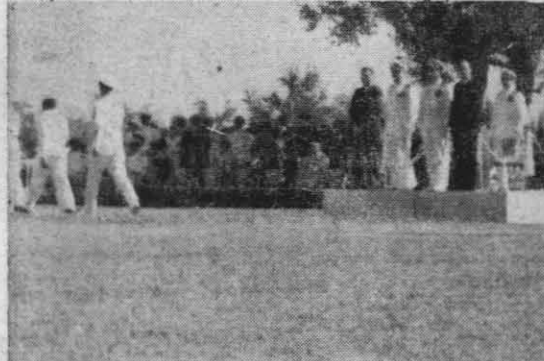
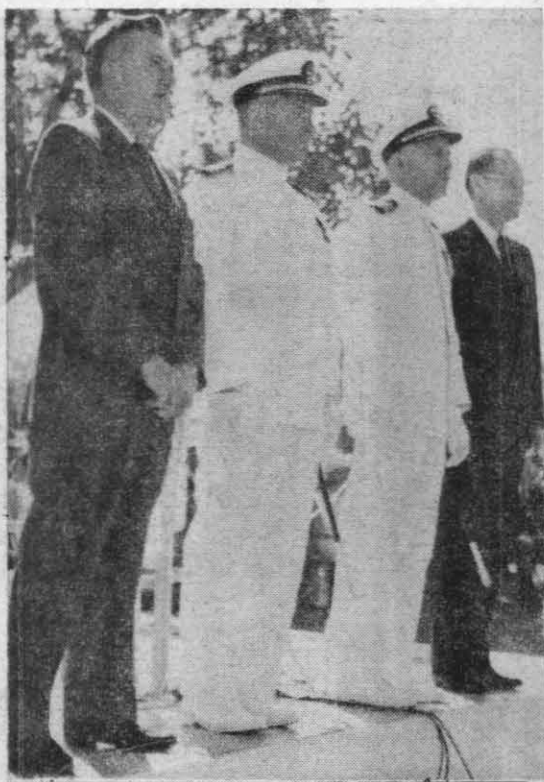

Mrs. Hardy on their return to NOTS," he commented.

Capt. Hardy prefaced his remarks of a more official nature by expressing his happiness in returning to China Lake.

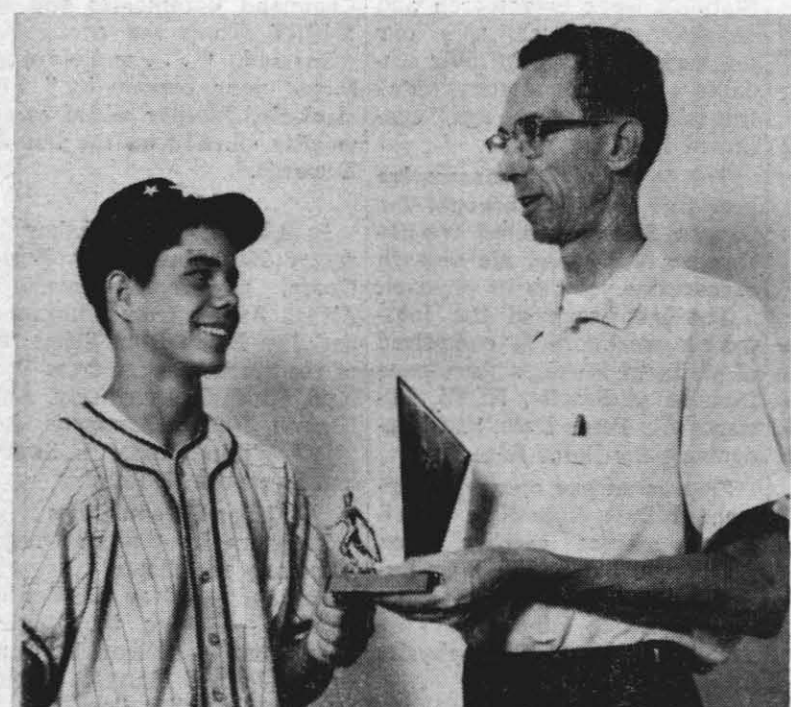
