Launch Campaign To Register All Eligible Voters

A vigorous, 10-day campaign to register all China Lake eligible voters was launched Tuesday with the establishment of a registration booth in front of the Commissary store.

The booth, to be operated during regular Commissary hours, is supplemental to 12 other locations throughout the Station.

The booth will be in operation through Thursday, Sept. 10, according to Maxine M. Sutherland, one of a dozen deputy registrars appointed for the area.

Electors who should register are those who will be 21 years of age by election day, those who will have been a resident of the State of California for one year and of the County of Kern for 90 days prior to election; also naturalized citizens who will have been a citizen of the United States by August 5, 1964, which is 90 days prior to election day.

Voters should re-register if they have moved from one precinct to another within Kern County on or before September 10, 1964, or who failed to vote at the General Election in 1962. Voters who were registered and voted at the General Election in 1962 and have not changed their addresses, do not need to re-register, nor do voters need to re-register if they were registered since said General Election and have not moved.

California law permits new residents who have resided in the state at least 54 days, but less than one year prior to the general election at which presidential electors are to be selected, to vote for presidential electors only.

K. H. Booty Honored As Station Pioneer

Kelvin H. Booty, Head of Engineering Department, and one of the original Station pioneers, marked his second decade of service to NOTS this week during brief ceremonies that included the award of a 20-year Federal service pin.

The presentation was made to Booty by H. G. Wilson, Associate Technical Director of NOTS.

Booty is the first Station employee to receive recognition for 20 years of local service. A special NOTS pin is currently being designed for award to Booty and others whose service dates back to the establishment of the Station.

Born in Australia, the longtime NOTS man joined the command in 1944, coming here from the Chicago area where he had worked in civilian industry.

His first local assignment was with the Research Department as a mechanical engineer.

One of Booty's early assignments included directing the machine shop.

In the years subsequent to his arrival here, he has worked with the Office of the Technical Director, Design and Production Department and assumed his present job as Head, Associate Technical Director for Engineering, in July 1954.

It is important for you to maintain a permanent file of all records pertaining to your military service. Save copies of orders, papers showing dates on which you received medical attention, discharges, and other papers about your military history.

Information from these records is often required for Veterans Administration forms, and having the information on file may help you or your survivors to expedite a claim or receive a benefit.

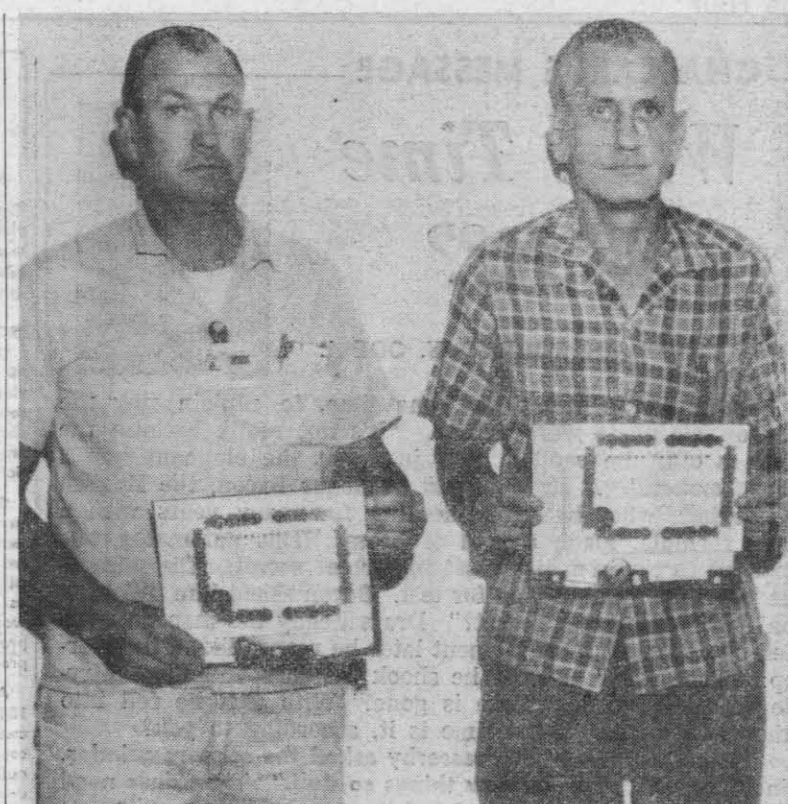
Your personnel office maintains a record of emergency data form on you, but it is your (Continued on Page 8)
