

New CNO Issues 'Green Stripers' Aimed At Improving Service Life

'The essence of leadership is to lay out one's objectives and to meet these objectives in a manner that provides satisfaction for our people in their jobs and in their personal lives. I have been entrusted with that leadership today."

Admiral Elmo R. Zumwalt, Jr., USN, spoke those words July 1 at the U.S. Naval Academy, Annapolis, Md., during the CNO change of command ceremonies.

Admiral Zumwalt soon put his words into action by issuing directives to bring more satisfaction into the personal and professional lives of Navymen

More than 170 action letters called "Green Stripers" were first seven days in office. Each indicated a course of action, improvement or study which the CNO desired to get underway without delay.

Many of the directives are oriented toward the personnel field. Others extend more into the areas of operations, logistics, Research and Development and CNO's mandates include:

Sea Pay For All Hands. Enlisted men now receive a maximum of \$22.50 a month. The proposal is to have all crew members, officer and enlisted, get sea pay with a graduated scale up to \$115.00 depending on the cumulative number of years spent on sea duty. Admiral Zumwalt indicated that this program had top priority, and




A field of 48 teams will tee off in the Invitational October 3 for the first 18 holes of the 36-hole partners best ball handicap tournament.

A Proclamation

Uncontrolled fires continue to place a costly drain on th American economy. The tragedy of more than 12,000 deaths each year by fire is coupled with annual property losses exceeding \$2

It is hard to realize that responsible citizens permit this to happen when most fires can be avoided. Each of us can reduce this waste simply by eliminating fire-producing conditions and by being alert and careful in handling fire.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, RICHARD NIXON, President of the United States of America, do hereby designate the week beginning October 4, 1970, as Fire Prevention Week.

I call upon our citizens, singly and as a nation, to actively support fire prevention through civic groups, schools, business, labor, and farm organizations, State and local governments, and the fire prevention groups, including their own community fire departments, and the National Fire Protection Association. I urge the news media and other public information agencies to cooperate in promoting Fire Prevention Week as a prelude to year-round fire prevention

I also ask all Federal agencies, in cooperation with the Federal Fire Council, to assist the national effort to reduce loss of life and property from fire.

One way in which we can all assist this effort is by the reduction and elimination of false fire alarms. False alarms require the use of valuable fire fighting equipment which should be reserved for the bonafide protection of life and property. May this week be a reminder for all citizens to take appropriate action to arrest the needless and unwarranted interference with normal fire fighting operations and the ensuing cost to the taxpayer.

IN WITNESSWHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand this second day of July, in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred seventy, and of the Independence of the United States of Amreica the one hundred ninety-fourth.


Inspections will take place between 8:30 and 11:30 a.m. and between 12:30 and 4:30 p.m. each weekday for the rest of the month.
