

# New COMNWC Will Be No Stranger To Center

When Rear Admiral William J. Moran takes the helm of the Naval Weapons Center on October 22, 1970, he will be the second officer of the Rear Admiral rank to command the Navy's largest research and development facility in NWC's 27-year history. A veteran combat aviator of WW II and a man who interrupted his education to defend his country, RADM. Moran has the distinction of being ordered to duty at this command for the third time in his Naval career.

If RADM. Moran's accomplishments during his two previous duty tours at China Lake are any indication of the future of NWC under his command, the Navy Department can anticipate a very effective coupling of NWC resources to future Navy problems. RADM. Moran comes to the Center this time from the Office of Chief of Naval Operations where he has been Director of the Navy Space Program Division since November 1968.

While RADM. Moran was engaged in the Battle of Santa Cruz in 1942, the establishment of a Naval facility began on the Mojave Desert which was to become a significant part of his Naval career and whose destiny he would later influence.

It was not until 1949 that he was first ordered to report to China Lake for duty as Operations Officer on the staff of Capt. Thomas H. Moorer, Experimental Officer (now Adm. Moorer, Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff).

In July 1955 RADM. Moran reported again for duty at China Lake where he participated in airborne weapons systems development until September 1958.

He headed up the Assistant Experimental Officers' Group, now known as the Technical Officers. RADM. Moran's impact in the weapons field began to be evident during his second tour at NWC when he conceived the idea of instrumenting a loft bombing range at the Fallon, Nevada Bombing Ranges, patterned after the one located on NWC's Charlie Range, for expeditious training of combat pilots. This range became the forerunner of 12 such ranges designed, instrumented and developed throughout the world by the "know-how" of NWC engineers.

RADM. Moran's efforts were recognized by RADM. R. F. Hickey, Fleet Air Alameda, in a citation which read: "In originating the idea of the range at Fallon, you have substantially contributed to the increased skill

achieved by Naval and Marine aviators in vital weapons training . . . (which) will be greatly beneficial to the future operations in the U.S. Pacific Fleet and consequently to the security and defense of the entire United States."

The concept of military-civilian teamwork was exemplified in development of the Fallon Range — the sponsorship, leadership and military assistance of RADM. Moran and the technical and practical guidance of Rod McClung of the Aviation Ordnance Department. McClung was cited for his efforts in making it possible to install in some short 28 days the first loft bombing system in the country at the Center's Charlie Range. Other Center employees primarily involved and cited for their efforts were: Everett Hill, Charles Cook, Robert McClarry, Jesse Watson and Roy Leonard.

The special instrumentation was designed and developed by NWC engineers to assist in training combat pilots in the "loft bombing" technique just developed by the Navy's VX-5 Squadron based at China Lake. The significance of the idea is clear when it is realized that the flight training system doubled a pilot's bombing skill while reducing his training time by 75 per cent and provided a criterion of bombing efficiency and standardization never before realized, at the same time saving the taxpayers \$18,500,000 per year on fuel alone. Concerning the system, H. G. Wilson, then Associate Technical Director, commented: "The pilot is now able to gain the experience in four days that used to require four weeks, and he now achieves a skill that has never

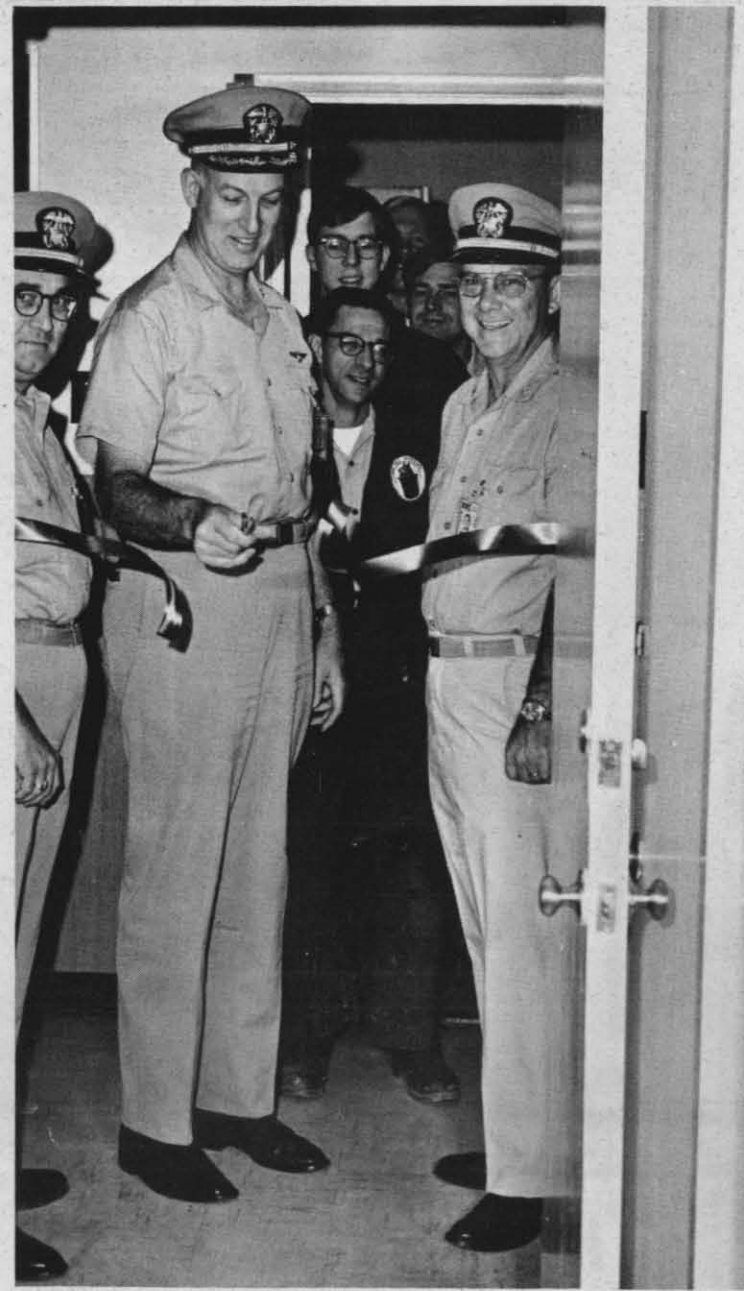

(Continued from Page 4) Agencies, such as the American-Korean Foundation, CARE, Planned Parenthood-World Population and Project HOPE may be designated by contributors as the agency to receive their donation.

Again in 1971, convenient payroll deduction pledges are offered to federal employees for their convenience. Pledges and information will be furnished by keymen when they make personal calls to every employee during the month long campaign.

All deductions will commence with the first pay period in 1971. Previous authorizations for deduction are automatically terminated at the end of the 1970 pay year so it will be necessary for donors to fill out new authorization cards for their 1971 donations.

Space is provided on the payroll deduction authorization cards for designation of funds to specific charities. Such funds go only to the agencies indicated by the donor. Keymen will assist donors to fill out their pledge cards at the time they make their in person calls. All contributions are deductible for income tax returns.

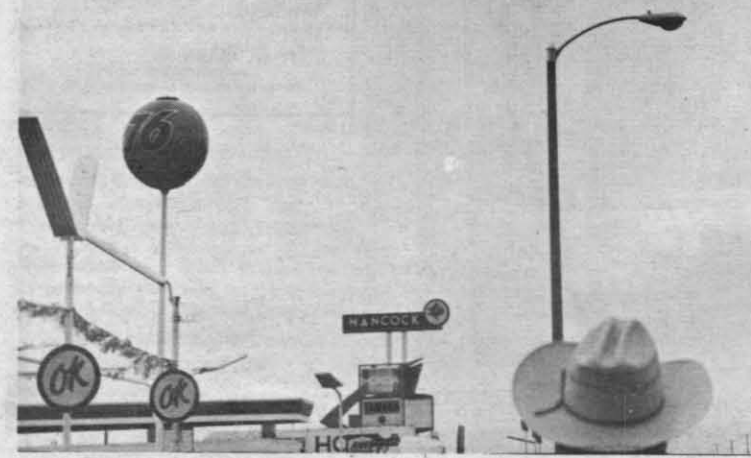

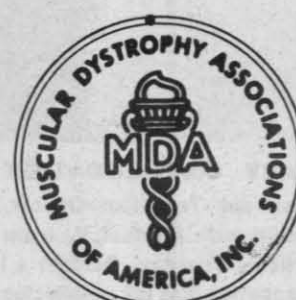
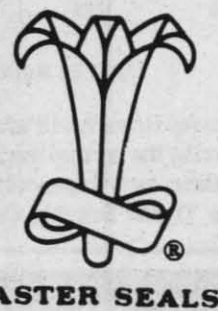
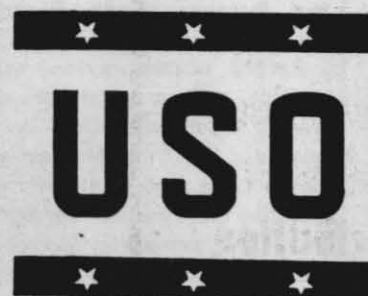


# Once For All - Your Fair Share

Federal employees throughout Indian Wells Valley will be approached by volunteer keymen during the period between October 12 and November 13 for their pledges in support of the annual Combined Federal Campaign. Included in the yearly drive are civilian and military employees of the Naval Weapons Center and postal employees of this area.

Goal of the 1971 drive is 100 per cent participation by all federal employees. Chairman of the CFC drive, Jesse Bell, predicted donations would amount to \$70,000 for 1971.

Included in the fund raising drive are agencies of the Indian Wells Valley United Fund, National Health Agencies and International Service Agencies. These encompass a wide range of services to the sick and needy throughout the world, as well as research to abate and prevent disease and crippling.

Federal employees may elect to donate to the general fund which is apportioned among participating charities or they may elect to designate agencies of their choice. Designated funds are earmarked for distribution solely to those charities indicated on pledge cards by donors.

The campaign as it applies to the

local area, is aimed at direct financial support of community service organizations and charitable groups based locally. These include Scouting activities, retarded children programs, camp facilities for local children, hospital aid to patients who are without funds, and emergency relief to residents and transients.

The local Red Cross and the Family Counseling Service are two more groups which benefit through the United Fund. Other local agencies which receive help are Teen Challenge, the China Lake Mountain Search and Rescue Group, Help Line and Reality Program.

National Health Agencies, to which contributors may designate for a share of their contribution, or the entire amount, include the American Cancer Society, American Heart Association, Easter Seal Agency, Muscular Dystrophy Association and the Society for the Prevention of Blindness. These agencies are dedicated to the care of the sick, to research, education and service.

The March of Dimes and the National Multiple Sclerosis Society are included under National Health Agencies.

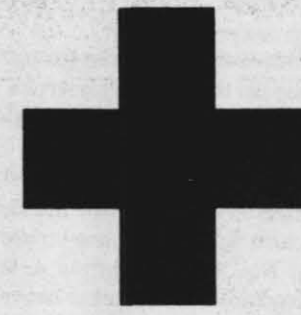
