

On Thursday, October 22, at 10:30 a.m., on the Administration Circle, Captain Melvin R. Etheridge, USN, will be relieved by Rear Admiral William J. Moran, USN, as Commander, Naval Weapons Center.

The ceremony will be both a change of command and a retirement ceremony for Capt. Etheridge, who relieved Capt. G. H. Lowe as Commander, NWC, in September, 1967. At the event, Capt. Etheridge will complete a Naval career which began in 1939 when he entered the U.S. Naval Academy. His career has included a tour as Commanding Officer of the USS Wasp, and also the USS Caliente. In addition, he was the **Executive Officer and Operations** Officer on the USS Independence. Other highlights of Capt. Etheridge's career include assignments as Operational Planning Officer, Joint Chiefs of Staff, from 1962 to 1964; and as a member of the Staff, COM-NAVAIRLANT, from 1952 to 1954. Capt. Etheridge holds a Master's Degree in Bioradiology from the University of California and has attended the U.S. National War College (1965-1966) and the U.S. Naval Postgraduate School (1949-



The Navy League of America is responsible for the celebration of Navy Day on 27 October.

Naval historians, however, relate that 13 October is a more significant date in the genesis of the U.S. Navy. It was on this date in 1775 that the Continental Congress passed legislation which provided for two U.S. Navy ships. The date 27 October was selected as Navy Day to honor the late President Theodore Roosevelt, who, in his lifetime, expressed a deep understanding of Naval affairs and the need for the United States to develop into a leading maritime power. October 27 was President Roosevelt's birthday. While he was the President. Theodore Roosevelt fought hard for a powerful Navy. He is remembered in Naval history for assembling the most powerful ships of the U.S. Fleet. He sent them on an around-the-world As part of the Center's par- goodwill mission to show the flag in not generally known as a leading power.

> Roosevelt's "Great White Fleet" turned out to be a brilliant diplomatic success. It inspired respect for the United States abroad, and at home it generated a feeling of national pride.

An immediate effect of the successful world cruise was that Congress made funds available for modernization and construction of new ships.

Pringle is a physicist affiliated with Petrodynamics Branch of the



The fund finances an annual lecture at the California Institute of Technology at Pasadena by an outstanding scientist of the world. Aage Bohr, Director of the Niels Bohr Institute of Copenhagen, will deliver the first memorial lecture October 29, 1970, it was announced by K. H. Robinson, local representative for the Memorial Fund. The fund was established after Dr. Lauritsen's death April 13, 1968. At that time, many persons including Lauritsen's friends and co-workers at NWC sought some means of expressing their tribute.

Charles C. Lauritsen was the civilian scientist most responsible for the location of NWC in Indian Wells Valley. In the summer of 1943 when the wartime rocket program of the California Institute of Technology went through a massive enlargement, Lauritsen will be held to welcome RAdm. recognized the need for a large new Moran and say "farewell" to Capt. area for testing rockets. 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


