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### Careful Planning Expedites VMA-513 Move

The problems encountered in the temporary deployment of a squadron of 159 enlisted personnel and 23 officers from one base to another can become quite involved without close coordination and careful planning.

VMA-513, the squadron of Marines that flew here for a short stay to train with its British Harriers, needed 11 C-130 transport aircraft to move personnel and maintenance equipment to China Lake.

The arrival of the transportation aircraft was after normal working hours - between 5 and 8 p.m. - but the Public Works Department

provided crews and heavy equipment needed to unload the aircraft. In addition, Public Works operated cranes and low boys used in the unloading of seven avionics vans needed by VMA 513 for Intermediate Aircraft Maintenance (IMA) support—a high level of maintenance.

Warrant Officer William Hill, of VMA 513, stated that the enlisted quarters were in excellent condition and that masters at arms were on hand and readily available to expedite billeting after normal working hours.

In addition, he said that the installation of telephone lines requested by the squadron was performed with no problems or delays.

Security matters were handled

by Lt. (jg) Dave Kurtz, VX-5 Communications Officer, and personnel of VX-5 prepared security badges for the visitors. Lt. Cmdr. Jess Carmen, VX-5 Aircraft Maintenance Officer, opened up the shops under his control to provide working space for the Marines.

ATC K. A. Edwards, of the VX-5 Maintenance Division, located a wireless intercom at the Chief Petty Officers' Club and arranged a loan. The Marines are using it for communication between the VMA 513 maintenance control division and shops at VX-5.

### Instruction on Assignment Of Family Housing Revised

An extensively revised Naval Weapons Center Instruction covering family housing assignment policy and procedures will be distributed next week to NWC civilian employees and military personnel living at China Lake.

The changes and revisions, worked out over an extended period of time by a top level 4-man committee will become effective on Jan. 1, 1972, when the procedures and policy described in this instruction will apply to all new housing assignments and reassignments.

Personnel presently occupying housing under previous policy, who are no longer eligible or have only limited eligibility for housing under the revised instruction, will be permitted to continue occupancy of their quarters subject to reassignment due to their reduced eligibility as long as their previously qualifying employment and family status continues.

The revised instruction on family housing assignment policy and procedures reflects a number of

changes in the policy and procedure for assignment of NWC housing. Such changes have been necessitated by a programmed reduction in the total available housing on the Center related to improvement of the remaining housing assets.

Other factors that have a bearing on the need for revising the family housing assignment policy and procedures are the substantial increase that has occurred in the number of NWC personnel at China Lake, and the need for readjusting housing eligibility requirements due to significant changes in the Center's work force, namely employee grade level and family size.

Major changes incorporated in the new NAVWPNSCEN Instruction on family housing assignment policy and procedures are:

- 1. Redesignation of selected units as bachelor housing. Bachelor housing will include the zero and 1-bedroom Old Apartments, zero and (Continued on Page 3)

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### Data Sought To Support Request For Special Line

Naval Weapons Center employees, who are interested in something being done to eliminate the necessity for so many quick trips back to Washington, are being asked this week to respond to an informal poll.

NWC officials are looking for information that can be used in justifying a request for the installation of a Secure Voice Communication System (tie line for classified calls) to Washington.

Such a system would involve placing or receiving calls from a centrally-located instrument at China Lake that would be connected with a telephone in the Pentagon and at Crystal Plaza in Washington.

Center employees who feel the availability of this service here would eliminate any of their travel to Washington are asked to call Brenda Burnett, at Ext. 3541, to indicate how many trips per year they would expect to save if equipment tied into the Secure Voice Communication System was installed here.

Callers are asked to supply both their name and Code number as quickly as possible, since there is some urgency to gathering the information that is being prepared to accompany the request for this service.
