

# Way Is Not Yet Open For **Partisan Political Action**

The Hatch Act section under fire Amendment rights. bars federal employees from participating in partisan political campaigns.

The 2-1 ruling came on a suit brought by the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) on behalf of the National Association of Letter Carriers and several Washington-area political committees. The court, composed of two federal district judges and an appeals court judge, ordered the U.S. Civil Service Commission to halt enforcement of the provisions, however the judges granted an immediate stay of their own ruling until the decision is reviewed by the U.S. Supreme Court.

Provided the ruling is upheld by the Supreme Court, it will have an impact on 2.7 million federal employees who have been banned from a variety of political activities under the 33-year-old

According to the court ruling, the Hatch Act ban is "overly broad and thereby violates the First Amendment rights of federal employees." In writing the majority opinion, District Court Judge Gerhard A. Gessell said the section of the act challenged in the suit is "ambiguous and unsatisfactory."

# Upsurge In Construction **Work Noted**


Start of the new fiscal year has been marked by an upsurge in construction work on the Naval Weapons Center-even as progress is continuing on three major pro-

Bob Leonard, former technical chairman of the All Faith Chapel that the organist can play any era Council and the man who wrote the specifications for the new organ, noted that the Allen custom-built organ uses new, large-scale integrated circuits and has approximately 200,000 transistors.

> This particular method of making musical sounds was developed by the North American Rockwell Co. (a firm which also develops integrated circuits) and the Allen Co., based in Pennsylvania, was licensed to build the new type organ which allows wave forms to be accurately reproduced by digital techniques.

Information can be stored in the stops or tones are needed, they can be programmed with an IBM card, Leonard said.

An interesting feature of the new organ, Leonard added, is that it is equipped with a transposer which permits the music to be heard in any key-irregardless of which key it is played in.

Future plans call for using the new organ for public concerts, since it will be possible to move it into the center of the proscenium where it can be seen by all those seated in the Chapel.







**Auto Drivers** Given Tips On 'Cycle Safety The number of motorcycles on

the road is growing by leaps and bounds. Here are a few things the Naval Weapons Center Safety Department suggests keeping in mind when a motorcycle moves into your driving scene.

Always give a cycle a full lane whether you are driving or are stopped at an intersection.

When overtaking a cycle pull into the left lane and don't pull back into the right one until you're sure it is safe to do so. Use your mirrors. Follow a cycle at a greater distance than you would another vehicle, especially if the road is

slippery. Be aware that a cycle may be hidden in a blind spot that will not block out a normal size vehicle from your field of vision.

Remember this rule: Treat a vehicle-just give it more room.




