

# Honor McNeil earns TD Award

Diabetes is a chronic disease in which, because of an insufficiency or total lack of the hormone insulin, the body cannot use the sugars and starches in the diet properly. The disease takes two forms: insulin-dependent (juvenile-onset) and non-insulin-dependent (maturity-onset) diabetes. The latter can usually be controlled without insulin (hence the name) and is the less serious form of diabetes. Non-insulin-dependent diabetes usually affects people 40 years of age or older and is more common among women than among men. Many of those affected are overweight, some seriously so.

It seems probable that the condition is due to an inherited predisposition and that some external agent is required to convert the genetic tendency into the disease. What that external agent is, is not

The hormone insulin is produced by small cells in the islets of Langerhans, scattered throughout the pancreas. Insulin regulates the body's use of sugar by metabolizing glucose so that it can be used for immediate energy needs or stored for future use in the form of glycogen. (Glucose is the main source of energy for all body cells; it is derived from carbohydrates during the digestive process or from fats or proteins that are converted to

Non-insulin-dependent diabetes results from the failure of the islets to produce sufficient insulin to overcome a number of anti-insulin factors that occur in certain individuals.

The most common symptom of diabetes is thirst, accompanied by frequent urination (as often as once an hour). There may be repeated infections of the skin, gums or urinary tract and fatigue, weakness or apathy. Tingling sensations in the hands and feet, cramps in the legs and blurred

vision are further symptoms. Sometimes there are no apparent symptoms at all, and the condition is detected in the course of a routine medical check-

The presence of diabetes is confirmed by a simple test in which the fasting blood glucose level is measured; if it is persistently elevated, the patient has diabetes.

The purpose of treatment is to relieve the symptoms, reduce the amount of glucose in the blood and urine and lower the risk of complications. For almost a third of non-insulin-dependent diabetics, the disease can be controlled by diet alone. The diet must be designed by a doctor and carefully adhered to by the patient.

In a typical diabetic regimen, calories (800 to 1500 daily, depending on the patient's excess weight) are distributed in small meals taken at regular intervals, keeping the blood glucose level as steady as possible. Carbohydrates make up 50 to 60 percent of the total intake, with plenty of fibrous foods such as whole grain breads and cereals, fruits and vegetables. Simple carbohydrates are restricted to 5 to 15 percent of all carbohydrate calories and should come from natural sources such as milk and fruit rather than from candies, cookies and so on. Of the total calories, 30 to 35 percent come from fats and 12 to 20 percent (depending on age and activity) from protein. Compared to the average American diet, the diabetic regimen requires reducing the intake of sugar, fat, protein and salt, and increasing the intake of complex carbohydrates and fiber. Key factors are controlling the intake of simple carbohydrates, particularly sugar, honey and other sugars; eating balanced meals and achieving and

The American Heart Association estimates 1.5 million people in the United States will suffer heart attacks in 1988 and about 500,000 of them will not survive.



# Military families need paperwork for smooth sailing overseas

More than 500,00 service men and women from the United States are stationed overseas. How many went over single and brought back a spouse? Or came back with a larger family?

According to Defense Manpower Data Center statistics, 16 percent of military wives are foreign-born. And of the roughly 47,000 Americans born abroad each year, a large proportion are children of U.S. services

But there's more involved with these joyous events than buying rings and setting up a nursery. For Americans overseas, getting married and having children born in a foreign country means a lot of paperwork that can turn into a red-tape nightmare - particularly if you leave the U.S. without important documents.

The U.S. State Department's Bureau of Counsular Affairs disthat much processing time for various applications could be eliminated if service members and their families had proper documentation, in particular, proper proof of citizenship.

The most easily recognized proof of citizenship is a valid U.S. passport. A certified copy of a birth record of naturalization certificate is also adequate proof. Without those documents, it is

But the facilities at the three colleges in the National Defense University cannot handle the number of officers needed for joint specialty assignments. DOD can either increase the university's size or turn to the intermediate and senior service schools to teach joint courses. At the request of the vice chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, the staff at the National Defense University came up with a joint curriculum for these schools, which was subsequently approved by the chairman, Joint Chiefs of Staff.

The Army, Navy and Air Force schools already have officers from the other services attending their institutions under the "sister-school"

Ideally, according to Hutton, there should be a joint-service faculty also; but this may not be possible at the service schools. The limits on students and faculty from other services will probably mean that only a portion of each school's program will be fully

At the intermediate level, the joint curriculum adds about 240 hours to the course: at the senior level, it's about 110 hours. "Obviously, adding this level of instruction means that something else is going to have to suffer," said Air Force Col. Bob Childs, director of academic plans and programs at the National Defense University. "The schools will probably take this time from the electives portion of their curricula. This is a trade-off, but the alternative is to expand the school year, and that isn't going to happen."

But the curriculum is not set in tablets of stone, according to Hutton, "Every new course has to be accredited," he said. "This usually happens after the first couple of classes have gone through. We don't have the luxury of so much time with this course of study. So, as the courses are being set up and before they start, the Joint Chiefs of Staff will be certifying what is being taught is what should be taught; and, if a school gets away from the direciton it should be headed, it can nudge it back in line before it gets too far off track."

Ten intermediate and senior-level schools plan to adopt the program. Hutton emphasized the services were getting into more joint training before the Goldwater-Nichols act became law, "Jointness is a vision," he said. "The need for it was noted long before (the Goldwater-Nichols act). It is not an easy vision to achieve. We breed pride in our own organizations.

"Most of the officers experience 20 years with a service, and it is difficult to change loyalties. But jointness is realizing that another service's solution may be the best. Understanding that fact is the purpose of joint professional military education."



# **Trout take** in Sierra

Trout fishing in most Sierra Nevada lakes and reservoirs is good to excellent thanks to the volume of lanted fish. Water levels continue to drop because of the dry weather and the California Department of Fish and Game (DFG) fisheries experts end taking advantage of the good conditions while they last.

The Bishop Chamber of Commerce reports eastern Sierra region fishng remains very good in most areas; but, as the dry weather reduces stream flow, the trend is expected to be a declining one in the next month.

In the Bridgeport area, Twin Lakes has excellent fishing for kokanee salmon by trollers using lead core line and a red magic lure. Shore-based anglers are landing rainbows up to three pounds with a marshmallow and salmon egg combination. At Virginia Lakes, fishing with a bubble-fly combination or worms and cheese bait brings the best results

All lakes in the June Lake Loop are good, say area anglers. Still fishing from boats works well with red salmon eggs or floating cheese for bait. Trollers are using triple teasers and Needlefish lures

Warm weather has reduced Mammoth area anglers to fishing for planted rainbows with salmon eggs, marshmallows, worms or an elk hair

Trout fishing remains slow at Crowley Lake, but the perch continue to bite on various colored perch jigs. Some nice native brown trout are being caught off Alligator Point by trollers. On Aug. 1, the late season begins at Crowley, with trout fishing restricted to artificial lures only and a two-fish limit.

Anglers fishing from shore are using Mepps, Panther Martins and Phoebes to land pan-sized rainbows at Convict Lake. Shore-based anglers can also use garlic marshmallows for

# Navy members need regular examinations

WASHINGTON (NES). Normally Navy members should have their eyes examined every two years. More frequent visits are necessary if an individual already has eye disease or is having symptoms such as blurred or decreased vision, pain, redness, double vision or seeing spots. Any unexplained change in the field of vision should be evaluated immediately. The appearance of flashing lights or multiple floaters ( black lines or specks) in the eyes signal an urgent need for an eye evaluation.

Sometimes a change to the current prescription will solve the problems but other reasons for deteriorating vision should also be investigated by an eye care specialist.

The Navy has three kinds of eye care specialists: ophthalmologists, optometrists and opticians.
