Fats and cholesterol Reduce consumption of fat (especially saturated fat) and cholesterol. Choose foods relatively low in these substances, such as vegetables, fruits, whole grain foods, fish, poultry, lean meats and low-fat dairy products. Use food preparation methods th

*Energy and weight control: Achieve and maintain a desirable body weight. To do so, choose a dietary pattern in which energy (caloric) intake is consistent with energy expenditure. To reduce energy intake, limit consumption of foods relatively high in calories, fats and sugars, and minimize alcohol consumption. Increase energy expenditure through regular and sustained physical activity.

-Complex carbohydrates and fiber: Increase consumption of whole grain foods and cereal pro-

, vegetables (including dried beans and peas) and fruits.

ium: Reduce intake of sodium by choosing foods relatively low in sodium and limiting the

*Aicohol: To reduce the risk for chronic disease, take alcohol only in moderation (no more than two drinks a day), if at all. Avoid drinking any alcohol before or while driving, operating machinery, taking medications or engaging in any other activity requiring judgment. Avoid

•Fluoride: Community water systems should contain fluoride at optimal levels for prevention of tooth decay. If such water is not available, use other appropriate sources of fluoride.
*Sugars: Those who are particularly vulnerable to dental caries (cavities), especially children, should limit their consumption and frequency of use of foods high in sugars.

*Calcium: Adolescent girls and adult women should increase consumption of foods high in cal-

cium, including low-fat dairy products.

-Iron: Children, adolescents and women of childbearing age should be sure to consume foods that are good sources of iron, such as lean meats, fish, certain beans and iron-enriched cereals and whole grain products. This issue is of special concern for low-income families.

The Code of Federal Regulations, Section 49 CFR 511.208, exempts buses from having seat belts installed for passengers. Safety belts are not required in buses due to their weight. Only vehicles with a weight of less than 6001 unladen pounds are required to provide and maintain seat belts.

January sees military pay and BAQ hikes

WASHINGTON-Pentagon officials have agreed to "target" or vary by pay grade, the Jan. 1 increase in the basic allowance for quarters, based roughly on reported differences in members' off base housing

The overall seven percent hike in housing money will range for individuals from 4.1 percent to 23 percent.

The new rates approved by manpower officials Nov. 10 are designed to even out-of-pocket housing costs for all pay grades, manpower officials said. With the new rates, the quarters allowance will cover about

61 percent of national median hous ing costs reported by service members in a survey last year.

The increases will take effect at the same time that all service mem bers receive a 4.1 percent increase in

Service members living off base in the United States receive variable housing allowance in addition to BAQ. The VHA rates for next year, which are based on local housing costs, have not been determined

Overall, rates will rise slightly more for people with dependents than those without dependents, and slightly more for enlisted members than for officers, Defense Department officials said.

WBCC study completed at Center

There is no evidence of a low white blood cell count problem at the Naval Weapons Center. That's the conclusion of the final phase of the Center's White Blood Cell Count Study, completed in November of last year.

The original study resulted from a finding by the Center's Occupational Health Program in the late 1970s that a larger percentage of employees than expected had what is considered a low white blood cell count. The objective of the original study was to determine the hematological profile of the Center's work force and compare it to the national average.

The proposal of this final phase was to examine an anomaly strongly suggested by results of the 1982-83 study that non-smoking members of the old Microwave Development Division had an average white blood cell count that was about one thousand units lower than the average for other NWC

The follow-up test group in the phase included current non-smoking members of the Radar and Threat Technology Division, formerly the Microwave Development Division. Employees of the Research Department were used as a control

According to statistical analysis of the results, both Center groups fell within the normal range for nonsmokers in the United States. The test group's average white blood cell count was 7.18 while the control group's average was 6.89. The non-smoking U.S. population's average white blood cell count is 6.2 to 7.2.

Dr. George Luiken, Captain, MC. USNR, from Naval Hospital San Diego and Dr. Abraham Potolsky of Santa Barbara's Sansum Clinic were consulted and were in agreement that there is no evidence of a low white blood cell count problem at NWC.

Dr. Potolsky speculates the anomalous results in 1982-83 may have been caused by the blood samples from that group setting too long after being drawn before being analyzed. This can lead to white cell breakdown and an artificially low white blood cell count.

With the results of this final phase in hand, the NWC white blood cell count study is considered
