'Skyray' optic fiber launch successful

New data link to weapon possible

Two-way communication between an airplane and its airborne missile is being improved using an optical fiber having the approximate diameter of a human hair.

As the missile is released, the fiber between the missile and the plane spools out, maintaining a constant, covert link between the two.

This "Skyray" project has been in the development stage at the Naval Weapons Center since 1985, and the first successful air launch of a missile using this communications system was completed Jan. 30.

"A fiber optic data link for air-launched weapons was still a theory until this successful air launch," said John Freeman, head of the Attack Weapons Department's Advanced Systems Division. "The fiber optic payout system has involved many scientists, engineers, and technicians at the Center and promises some great benefits to future weapon systems."

Because the two-way communication system uses a fiber optic link instead of a radio frequency (RF) link, the missile delivery is a covert operation. "Currently, the plane and the missile radiate to communicate with each other," explained Freeman. "These radiations could be intercepted or interfered with. The fiber optic data link will confine the communication to the airplane and the missile."

"Also, the fiber link allows the plane to communicate with the missile even if the missile's path takes it around or behind a mountain," he said. "Most RF systems require line-of-sight for communication."

This communication system is also highly jam-resistant. "Using the fiber link, the only instructions the missile can receive are those from the pilot," said Freeman.

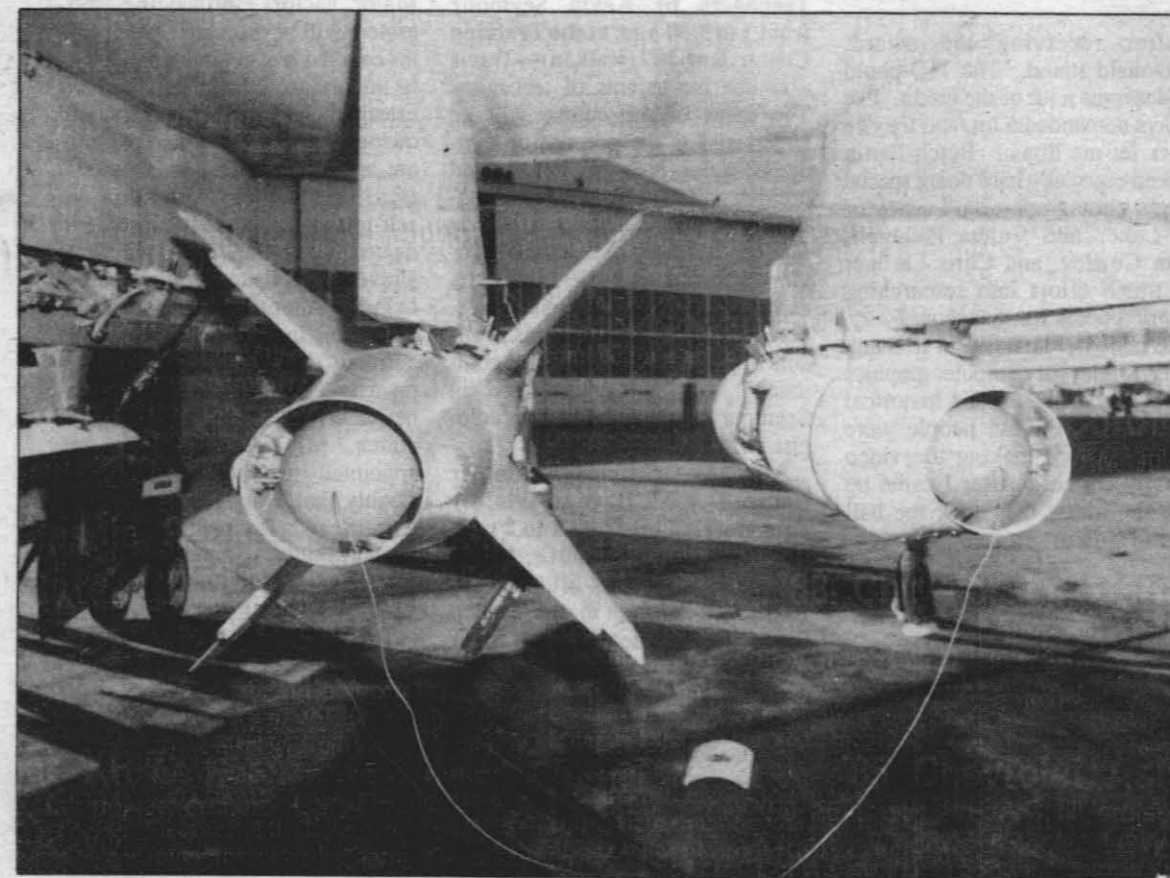
As a new technology, the optic fiber payout system is being developed in close cooperation with several other research

laboratories, especially Naval Ocean Systems Center (NOSC) Hawaii Lab and with several private companies, including Hughes Aircraft Company, the Boeing Company and AT&T.

A videotape of the successful air-launch of a missile using the fiber optic data link shows continuous communication between the missile and the aircraft from launch to impact. Video from the onboard missile camera is sent back to the plane via the optical fiber and recorded.

The project is funded under the Balanced Technology Initiative (BTI) and was begun in FY 1987 after the Army had achieved successes using the technology in a ground-launch situation.

Dr. Rick Habayeb oversees the project for the Naval Air Systems Command and visits NWC frequently for project updates. "The project has been successful because we have (Continued on Page 10)

Armed Forces Day celebration tomorrow

Self-guided tours of Michelson Laboratory will highlight the Naval Weapons Center's observance of Armed Forces Day tomorrow (Saturday).

On the 40th anniversary of this national observance, Armed Forces Day salutes the men and women who are "Keeping America Strong." Capt. John Burt, NWC Commander and Gerry Schiefer, Technical Director, invite Center employees, their families and residents of the Indian Wells Valley and surrounding areas to visit the lab.

The lab will be open from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Visitors will be able to see displays from various technical departments and view films about NWC (including the 1989 "Legacy of the Lake"). Several lectures are scheduled during the day including one on the Navy's partnership venture to produce geothermal energy on NWC land.

Expected to be included on the tour route in Michelson Lab are the machine shop, a Sidwinder missile

launching demonstration, an earthquake hazards display, microelectronics hardware display, a superconductivity demonstration, a Harpoon missile fuzing display and the Simulation Lab.

In the Engineering Lab, visitors will see interactive graphics and computer aided engineering work stations. NWC employees will be demonstrating the capabilities of computer-aided design/computer-aided manufacturing (CAD/CAM).

The lobby of Michelson Lab is expected to be full of static displays including mockups of various weapons developed at NWC, an ejection seat with an anthropomorphic dummy strapped in, and a metric video demonstration.

In the parking lot, NWC's Aircraft Department will display many of the numerous types of aircraft operated at China Lake. This is expected to include the A-7E Corsair II, A-6E Intruder, F-4 Phantom, QF-86 Sabrejet, A-4 Skyhawk, F/A-18 Hornet and the AV-8B Harrier.

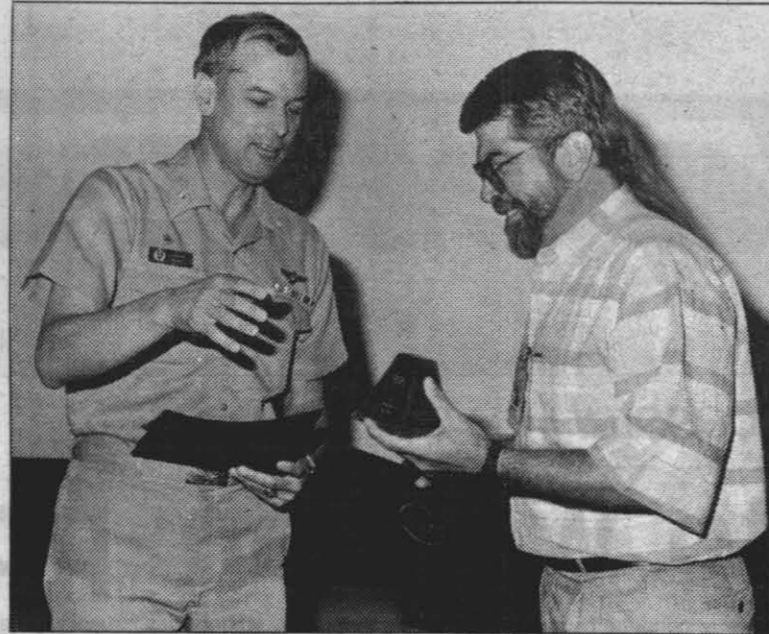

May 22—Dealing with Depression by Dr. Rita McCullough-Stanley, PhD from 9-11 a.m. at the Training Center, Rm. 107 (walk in)—This class will examine the types, symptoms, causes, and treatment of depression. Teaching methods will include lecture as well as student participation. Emphasis is on practical techniques to help a person cope with depression. Dr. McCullough-Stanley is a licensed clinical psychologist with a practice in Ridgcrest.

May 23—Dealing with Difficult Teenagers by Kevin Seymour from 1 to 3:30 p.m. at the Training Center, Rm. 107 (walk in)—This is a course for parents of teenagers. The focus of the course will be understanding the purpose of teenage behavior, both problematic and normal, and the effects this traumatic life stage (adolescence) has on families. Methods of handling behavior problems ranging from drug and alcohol use to rebellious opposition, and the support systems available to parents and teens in the community will be discussed. May 24—Osteoporosis: Mother Nature Doesn't Have to Win! by Pam Harris PhD from 1 to 2 p.m. at Mich Lab 1000D (walk in)—Medical experts estimate that 20 million people in the United States have osteoporosis, many without knowing it, and the disease is responsible for approximately 1.3 million fractures a year. Can it be prevented? You bet. Recent studies have revealed specific physical, dietary, and lifestyle risk factors associated with osteoporosis. These factors will be discussed along with dietary and exercise options which

can be easily implemented into your lifestyle to prevent this disease. Dr. Harris' credentials include a PhD in food science and technology from the University of Nebraska as well as a MA in food science and human nutrition from Wayne State University and BS in medical technology from Michigan State University. She is currently employed as an administrative assistant in the Wellness Office at NWC.

May 25—Building Your Self-Esteem by LaNelle Thompson, from 1 to 2 p.m. at Mich Lab 1000D (walk in)—A positive self-image, or self-esteem, is a major part of a successful and balanced wellness program and winning lifestyle. When changing health behaviors and attitudes, we can hardly expect ourselves to stay involved for any length of time without some kind of gain or reward for our effort. That gain or reward will come sooner, and will last longer, when we possess a positive self-esteem. However, few people really understand the concept of self-esteem, nor how we develop our life-long pattern of behavior. Major factors influencing self-esteem will be discussed. Other topics covered are: communication and its importance to understanding self-esteem, behavior styles and the uniqueness of each individual participant, and value systems and their relationship to the formation of self-image. LaNelle Thompson graduated from the California State University in Bakersfield with a BA in Public Administration with a concentration in criminal justice. She currently operates her own management and training consultant business, LaNelle Thompson and Associates. Mrs. Thompson is an appointed member of the Kern County Task Force to Promote Self-Esteem and Personal and Social Responsibility.

Top Reserve CPO

Bob Voigt saluted for work as OIC

MSC Bob Voigt was recently named Chief Petty Officer of the Year for the Naval and Marine Corps Reserve Center, Bakersfield. Assistant Officer-in-Charge of RNMCB-17 Reserve Detachment 0217, Voigt was cited for serving as its Officer-in-Charge (OIC) from January 1 through December 31, 1988.

Chief Voigt shouldered the responsibilities of his temporary position with enthusiasm. He was responsible for planning and estimating for NWC Seabee projects, writing enlisted evaluations, writing and distributing plans of the month, and supervising the Det 0217 Seabees and coordinating its Active Duty for Training plans.

The only Mess Management Chief to perform as OIC in his regiment of 1600 Seabees, Chief Voigt continued to fulfill his normal duties while on this additional assignment. He regularly makes two trips a month to Bakersfield and maintains weekly contact with the Reserve Center to coordinate detachment activities and assure a smooth flow of necessary paperwork.

When in the field with battalion or regiment, he runs the field kitchen, feeding up to 450 men per hour out of a tent with 14 ovens. If a whole battalion of 600 shows up for chow, the crew can feed them in an addi-

tional 45 minutes.

"I love to cook," Voigt said. "Acting as OIC was a challenge I enjoyed, and my usual job as AOIC is also a pleasure, but what I really love is going to the field and feeding the troops."

Since that's not an option he can exercise all that often, Voigt concentrates on the projects his men can accomplish for the Center.

"We are able to get a lot of construction work done here at NWC," Voigt continued, "mainly because we have so much support—from Capt. Burt down the line. We've been given our own spaces, and Capt. Kelley authorizes Public Works to loan us all the equipment we need to get our projects done properly. BUC George Chisenall, who works full-time for the Geothermal Division, volunteers his own time to spend all of each drill weekend working with us. He also serves as the detachment's self-help coordinator, assigning appropriate customer requests to us."

"When not at work on specific projects, detachment members keep to a training schedule organized by UT1 Lu-Ellen Hays. We're always busy, and that makes us happy."

"The CPO of the Year award is very gratifying," he concluded, "but working with such a great bunch of Seabees at a place like NWC is my best reward."

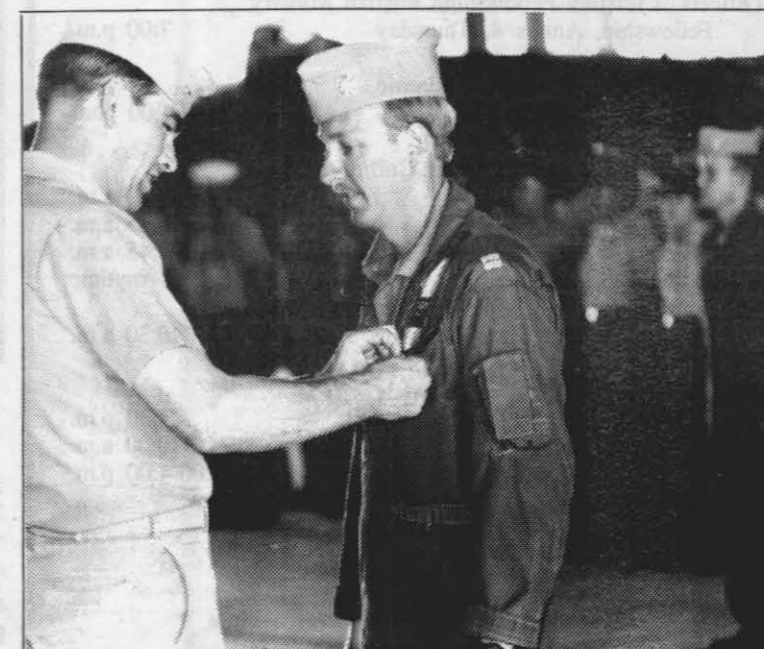
VX-5 aviator earns award





During the open season, employees have the opportunity to change

their current enrollment or make an initial participation election. Election forms processed by July 1 will be effective the first pay period in July, which starts July 2. Enrollments

received on or after July 2 will be effective the beginning of the following pay period.

Employees wanting to change their current enrollment election or begin

participation in the Thrift Savings Plan, should contact their Personnel Management Advisor (PMA) to schedule a time to come into Personnel and complete the election form.

Questions answered in regard to GEHA forms

There have been questions recently in regard to filling out GEHA claim forms.

The yellow E-1 claim form is to be submitted one time per person on the plan every twelve months. If more than one person is on the plan, then one yellow form must be submitted for each person on the plan, not once a year, but twelve months from the day the last one was sent in.

The attending physician forms (E-2) are filled out by the physician's office, unless an itemized bill is submitted (for example, Drummond's

bill). The diagnosis or diagnosis code, amount, treatment, physician's tax identification number, service code, name and address, and date must be included. If an itemized bill is submitted, an insuror does not have to fill out any of the GEHA forms, but should keep a copy of the bill for his/her records.

For further information about GEHA, call 1-800-821-6136. The number is frequently busy or the caller may be put on hold, but keep trying.

Prospective students should send a stamped, self-addressed envelope and enclose a letter stating their name, address, prior experience and

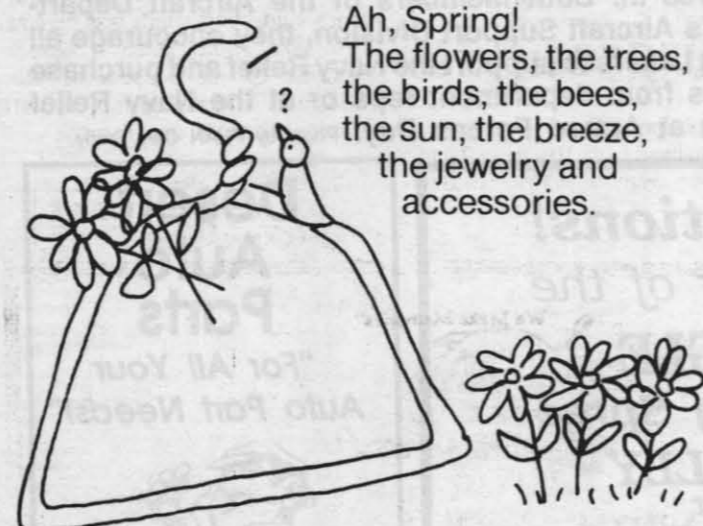

been able to tap the combined knowledge, talents and experience of many China Lakers," he said. "Along with the scientists and engineers at NOSC, they have taken on this technological challenge with a great deal of perseverance and creativity."

Lt. Col. Tom Massicote flew the successful air launch mission and has served as the project pilot. Dwayne Harms is the Skyway project manager and Fay Hoban is responsible for the system design and integration.

John Ayers is the deputy project manager; Hal Duff, Bill Marten and Gunars Svika are responsible for mechanical integration; Wayne Burnett is responsible for fabrication of the payout system; Bob Hoffman and Marie Kirk have supplied the electronic integration expertise; Mark Lamert is responsible for mechanical design and Rich St. Claire has been in charge of the electronic design and integration.

Continuing tests will address the issue of the utility and durability of the fiber optic data link in a tactical environment.

"The potential benefits to the Navy from the successful development of this technology are substantial," said Freeman. "Fiber optics offers the future prospect of an airborne data link between aircraft and weapons that is covert, virtually jam-proof, can be used non-line-of-sight, and has the capacity to support the transmission of a large quantity of video and data. This technology could ultimately lead to widespread deployment on a variety of future tactical missiles," he concluded.

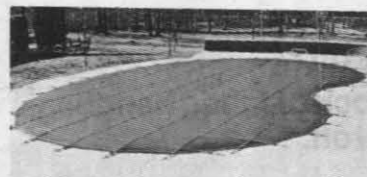

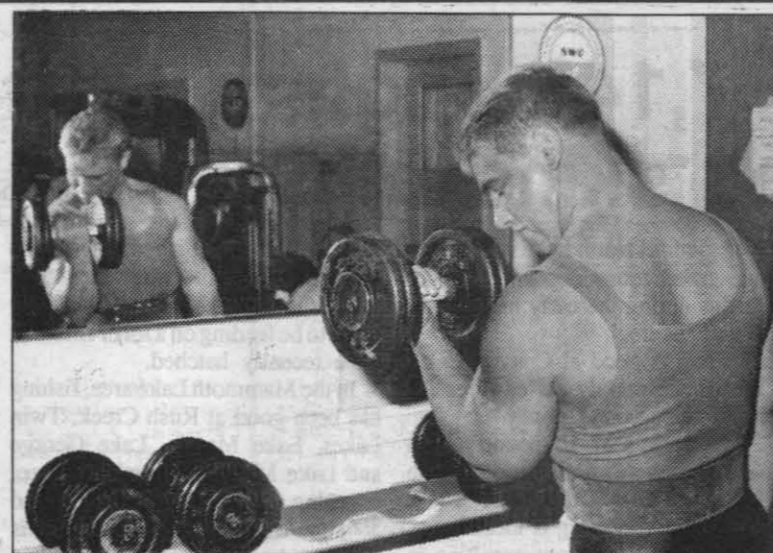

The Navy's standardized automated procurement system is coming to the Naval Weapons Center. The system known as APADE (Automation of Procurement and Accounting Data Entry) is currently operational at 18 activities but China Lake will be the first Navy Lab to implement the system.

The APADE software is centrally managed by the Naval Supply Systems Command, with technical support from the Fleet Material Support Office. The hardware environment is part of the Navy's SPLICE NET (Stock Point Logistics Integrated Communications Environment) utilizing the Defense Data Network.

APADE was developed in four phases. NWC is implementing phase III, which automates small purchases, and plans for phase IV implementation, which includes major contracts, sometime in the spring of 1990.

The phase III software provides a wide range of automation benefits for the small purchase function. These include both quality and productivity benefits. In the area of

productivity the system is expected to reduce typing, reproduction, and distribution of procurement documents. It should allow procurement personnel to spend less time locating sources and justifying prices. Increased buyer productivity should result in reduced lead time for customers. On-line access by customers, planned for late summer, will increase customer access to status on procurement actions in process.

In the area of quality, the system provides for standardized procurement and document control as well as buyer support services and management information. These features allow for increased consistency and procedural accuracy along with quicker information retrieval. The information contained in the system will provide price history and source information for procurement personnel and provide access to workload aging

information for better manpower loading and increased accountability. The TANDEM hardware used by the system is known for its high

level of reliability. It consists of 4 CPUs for on-line transaction processing with 32 MB of main memory and 5.4 GB of mirrored disk storage. It is expandable to 16 CPUs and 256 MB of main memory. With phase IV implementation comes optical disk storage. It utilizes parallel/distributed architecture and is fault tolerant for all major components.

The system will be utilized by the individual buying groups located at nine different physical locations on the Center including the Airfield and CLPL. Future communications enhancements will include TCP/IP interface to the Center's Ethernet and will allow users across the Center to access the data in APADE.

Although the implementation of APADE at NWC will be transparent to most at NWC, all those involved in the implementation predict continued improvement in the Procurement Department's ability to provide superior service to all its clients.

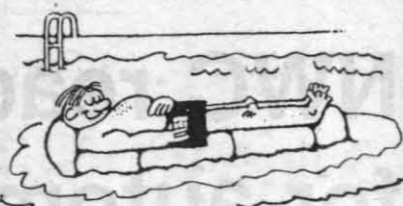

More than 7,140 anglers test their fishing skills at Crowley

Ben L. Toe won the H. Werner Buck Memorial Trophy for a six-pound brown trout caught at McGee Inlet while trolling during the opening week of the 1989 general trout season in the eastern Sierra region. According to the Bishop Chamber of Commerce, there were more than 7,140 anglers on Crowley Lake during fishing season's opening weekend. While the number of fish in catches were down from last year, the fish being caught are larger than previous years.

According to the chamber's report, fishing is great in the Lone Pine area. Diaz Lake is releasing two to three-pound trout mostly on power bait and Velveeta. Catfish and bass are being caught in the lower Owens on worms and spinner bait.

Anglers are catching nice size browns and rainbows on worms and mini micro marshmallows at Big Pine Creek and three to four pound lunkers on baby night crawlers or crickets at the river.

In the Bishop area, lots of planters are being caught on power bait, mini tube jigs and green bodied mosquitos at Intake 2. A few small brookies and browns are also being caught.

While South Lake is open and ice-free, fishing has been slow. At Sabrina, morning fishing is good despite a low lake. Bait fishing is good with crawlers for rainbows. Evening lows are around the 50s and the highs are around the 70s. Limits of planted rainbows are

not many browns. Fishermen in boats with scopes say that there are lots of fish sitting on the bottom, but they seem to be feeding on a lot of flies that have recently hatched.

In the Mammoth Lake area, fishing has been good at Rush Creek. Twin Lakes, Lake Mamie, Lake George and Lake Mary are mostly ice free, releasing rainbows and browns up to 3/4 pounds on spinning lures, such as Kastmasters and Phobes, as well as power bait, worms and night crawlers.

Fishing over the weekend in the June Lake area has picked up considerably. Larger fish and cutthroat trout are being taken out of June Lake on Dave Davis and night crawlers. Shore fishing is good near the beach with power bait, yielding up to five pound rainbows.

Limits in rainbows are being caught at Silver Lake by those fishing in waders by Rush Creek entrance using red eggs, velveeta or power bait.

With almost every cast, fish are being caught at Grant Lake. Fishing is only fair at the Bridgeport Reservoir. The back side of Twin Lakes is good for pan-size fish, while the lower twin is best for trolling and large fish.

Bait fishing and spinners such as panther martins, is best for Robinson Creek. Due to possible upcoming storms, hopeful anglers are advised to check weather reports before going into the back country.
