



Service salutes Lt. Prusinski

Family, friends and co-workers paid their respects to Lt. Mark A. Prusinski, USN, at a memorial service held Sunday afternoon at the Naval Weapons Center's All Faith Chapel.

Lt. Prusinski died last Wednesday morning in the crash of his QF-86 Sabrejet near Trona. This was the first fatal crash involving an NWC aircraft since LCdr. Theodore Faller died in the crash of his OF-86 in August, 1979.

During the memorial service, Lt. Prusinski was eulogized by his brother, Norman and two fellow Navy aviators. Norman Prusinski's eulogy was in the form of a letter to his brother, recalling his accomplishments, and his love of life and of family. Lt. Scott Neuman, former squadron mate and room mate with Lt. Prusinski recalled his love of adventure and love for his family.

Lt. Prusinski was born in Tarrytown, New York in 1962. A 1984 graduate of the U.S. Naval Academy, Lt. Prusinski was assigned to VA-196 at Whidbey Island, Wash., before coming to China Lake in August of last year.

He is survived by his wife, Michelle, his mother, a brother and two sisters.

Census forms are no mystery

Questions have arisen about what to do with official census forms. Instructions informed most who live within city limits to mail the form by April 1. It's not too late, but please hurry--if the form is not returned completed, an enumerator will have to pay you a visit.

In some cases, instructions say to hold the completed form for a visiting census worker. Complete your form with information that was true on Census Day, April 1. Sometime within the next four to five weeks an enumerator will be in your area.

If you did not receive a census form in the mail, be patient. A census worker will visit you to complete your form. Enumerators will be working days, evenings and weekends to complete the census.

Long plans to compete in the upcoming California State Novice Championships in Santa Rosa, Calif., in July.



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

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
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
