Teamwork provides solution to hazardous waste problem at labs

By Peggy Shoaf

eamwork and the desire to help protect the environmental have resulted in a plan to provide a central point for collecting and storing hazardous wastes generated rom Michelson and Lauritsen labs.

Coming to work and finding cans of azardous waste dumped in a trash can or in front of an office isn't something nost employees at Michelson Lab want to find. While it doesn't happen often, it does happen. People often don't know what constitutes hazardous waste, the proper procedures for getting rid of it or they find those procedures too much of a bother and decide to leave it to somene else to take care of.

Unfortunately, that kind of behavior is a violation of all kinds of ordnances and laws, which could result in some heavy fines and penalties, not to mention criminal action.

To help alleviate the problem, some Michelson Lab employees got together to figure out a solution to the improper disposal by coordinating a central collection point for storing hazardous waste and a single point of contact who "was an expert" in properly disposing of

Common hazardous wastes include solvents of any kind, including cleaning solvents; paints; oils; and so forth.

"The Engineering Prototype Branch really started the ball rolling," said Richard Smith, the facility coordinator for Michelson Lab. "The branch's hazardous waste coordinator, Bob Steele, and his assistance, Dave Pate, decided the branch had a serious problem in properly handling its own hazardous waste. To help eliminate that problem, they designated two facilities as 'holding' facilities. Then they decided they had enough room to hold additional hazardous waste if other people from Michelson Lab wanted to use it. Later

Question

My question is two part. There are many more people who will shortly be required to move to Hangar Four and the Advanced Weapons Lab. (1) What are the plans for a traffic light/turn lane at the intersections of Sandquist and Lauritsen Roads for traffic going west on West Lauritsen to Hangar Four and AWL? (2) The road, West Lauritsen, is in great need of repair and I am sure there will be many angry people (including myself) who will need front end repair work after driving on that road. My second question is, when will the road be repaired?

Answer:

The west portion of Lauritsen Road is indeed in very poor condition. Minimal maintenance has been done as this section of road is planned to be removed when the new fuel farm project is constructed this year. The first item of construction in the new fuel farm project will be the new access roads to the new hangars.

I have enclosed three drawings from the construction project that describe the proposed work. The first drawing shows the proposed roadwork in the base bid. This includes the removal of the west portion of Lauritsen Road, realignment and reconstruction of the Sandquist and Lauritsen intersection, and the reconstruction of a portion of Talon Road up to the hangar access road.

The proposed new intersection layout at Sandquist and Lauritsen is shown in the second drawing. If sufficient funds are available in this project, Lauritsen Road will be extended across to the hangar access road as shown in the third drawing. All contractors' proposals were due at EFA WEST on March 7. The selection process started on March 8 and hopefully the contract will be awarded in April



et me begin by saying how privileged I feel to have the opportunity to represent the talented and dedicated men and women of the Naval Aviation Systems Team. It is a great honor to assume command of an organization so ready to meet our future challenges. VAdm. Bowes has provided the vision and direction for true cultural change, and has set us on the right path. I pledge to continue the journey. With your help, we will make the vision a reality.

To do this, we must acknowledge the needs and contributions of those who measure the quality of our support-our customers. Our Navy/Marine Corps Team demands the highest level of service to protect our national interests here and abroad. I see four primary areas by we will be expected to add value.





Job Satisfaction

The survey indicates most employees remain satisfied with their job, with S&E's being the most satisfied. When asked, "I like working here," an overwhelming 91% of the China Lake employees and 87% of the employees at Point Mugu responding either agreed or strongly agreed with this statement.

this question with 42% agreeing or strongly agreeing, 9% remain undecided. At Point Mugu, 38% agree or strongly agree with the statement, while 7% are undecided.

Attitudes on Demonstration Project Employees who have been in the project the longest tended to give it the most support. When asked to agree or disagree with the statement "I am in favor of the demonstration project," an average of 64% of those at San Diego and China Lake (where the project has existed the longest) agreed or strongly agreed with the statement. Another 34% remains undecided in their opinions about the Demonstration Project. Past experience at both China Lake and San Diego has shown new participants in a personnel demonstration project tend to remain undecided until they have more experi-

You may be on your own for 72 hours or more after an earthuake. The magnitude 6.7 Northridge earthquake caused more than 9.000 injuries. The majority of them were not serious and did not require hospitalization. In fact, agencies were able to complete most essential life-saving operations within hours.

In a larger, regional earthquake, however, emergency medical services agencies may be overwhelmed, and you may be on your own for 72 hours or more.

A first aid kit is an essential part of any earthquake kit, especially after a large, regional earthquake. Your kit should include the following items to treat injuries that commonly result from earthquakes: first aid book, bandages, adhesive strips, butterfly bandages, elastic bandages, roller bandages, dust masks, 4x4 sterile gauze dressings (individually wrapped), magnifying glass to see splinters, nonallergenic adhesive tape, safety pins, scissors, triangular bandages, antiseptic wipes, blunt-tipped scissors, latex gloves, small plastic cup top wash/rinse eyes, space blanket, thermometer, antibiotic salve, tweezers, high-absorbency pads, tincture of benzoin or other disinfectant, saline for eye irrigation, small paper cups, aspirin and acetarninophen, liquid soap, disposable towels and tissues.

Earthquakes can cause a number of injuries. The most common

Plan ahead for emergency survival with first aid skills

are stopped breathing, bleeding, cuts from flying or broken glass, shock and broken bones.

If a person has stopped breathing and if the victim appears to be unconscious, tap and shout, "Are you okay?" and proceed as fol-

Open the airway; use head tilt/chin-lift and check breathing for 3-5 seconds unless you suspect a spinal injury.

If there is no breathing, give two breaths—1-1/2 seconds per

Check the victim's breathing and pulse at the side of the neck for 5-10 seconds. If there's a pulse but no breathing and the victim is an adult,

give him or her one breath every five seconds. If there's no pulse, begin CPR and get medical assistance.

Bleeding: Using a sterile dressing or clean cloth, apply firm, steady pressure. Elevate the wound if you do not suspect a broken bone. If bleeding continues, press harder with a new dressing on top of the old one.

Shock: Keep the victim lying down; elevate his/her feet if there is no spinal injury. Prevent chilling; obtain medical help.

Breaks, sprains: Immobilize injuries such as broken, dislocated or sprained bones with splints or slings.

question, "How much did your performance appraisal help you to assess your strengths and weaknesses?" found 53% at China Lake and 61% at Point Mugu felt the system was somewhat to very helpful in assessing their strengths or weaknesses.



When to expect your money from the IRS

If you filed your federal tax return and are expecting a refund, give the Internal Revenue Service six weeks before you call to check on its status. Six weeks applies if you file a paper copy tax return, said IRS officials. The processing time from receipt of an electronic tax return to issuance of a refund check is about three weeks. Call IRS' Automated Refund System at toll-free 1-800-829-4477 if you haven't received your check at the end of six weeks for a paper return and three weeks for an electronically filed one. The system operates Monday through Friday, from 7 a.m. to 11:30 p.m. EST, for touchtone telephones. Call during normal working hours, Monday through Friday, if you use a rotary telephone. IRS officials said hours may vary depending on where you live.

The information required when you call the system includes your Social Security number, filing status and the whole dollar amount of the refund you expect.



'Women's History Month' message from the CNO

WASHINGTON — The following is the CNO's message in honor of Women's History Month:

The 1995 Women's History Month theme, 'Promises To Keep,' explores the pioneering work of women in all occupations and reminds today's generation of the obligation we have to build upon the legacy of these trailblazers.

In every decade and in every Navy community, there have been women who have responded to the needs of their nation

Decisions made during states of emergency allowed women to move into many new roles in the Navy. Women served at sea during some of our nation's earliest conflicts.

Women contract nurses served on Navy ships during the War of 1812 and in the Civil War. Following establishment of the Navy Nurse Corps in 1908, the role of women continued to expand, growing to include service in hospital ships and transports in World War I.

On March 17, 1917, Loretta Perfectus Walsh enlisted in the U.S. Naval Reserve, becoming the first active-duty Navy woman, and the first woman to serve in any of the armed forces in a non-nurse occupation.

By the end of World War I, more than 11,250 yeoman females were serving in the U.S. Navy.

laid the foundation for the establishment of Women Accepted for Volunteer Emergency Service (WAVES) in World War II. More than 100,000 WAVES

During this period, medical needs moved Navy nurses into combat zones. Navy nurses were captured in Manila by the Japanese, becoming the Navy's first women prisoners of war. Navy flight nurses assigned to Guam in 1944 were part of aircrews to evacuate wounded from Iwo Jima and Okinawa. The consistently high-caliber performance of Navy nurses and WAVES convinced Congress to permanently incorporate women into the armed forces in 1948.

Navy women continued to serve at sea and in flight crews through the Korean War and Vietnam conflict.

As non-traditional duty for women became conventional, the next generation of Navy women opened new doors in naval service. In 1978, women first served on non-combatant vessels in sea going ratings and designators.

Last year marked 16 years of women serving on support ships, and the start of yet another role for Navy women. Women's History Month 1994 sailed into previously uncharted waters, with the ordering of women to combatant ships.

This year's Women's History Month celebrates this new era with USS Dwight D. Eisenhower's return to home

Everyone is familiar with Adm. Grace Hopper, the innovative computer genius, but there are other Navy women who can inspire us. Phyllis Daily, the first Black Navy nurse, commissioned 50 years ago in March 1945; and Alene B. Duerk, the first woman to achieve flag rank in July 1972. Today, the Navy has seven women flag officers and three women afloat commanding officers. Currently there are 13 women command master chiefs, six of whom are serving at sea or with deployed squadrons. Today's women have also walked in the footsteps of such groups as Women Air Service Pilots, the forerunners of the first Navy women aviators winged in

Twenty years after the pinning of these pioneers, Navy women F/A-18 pilots became the first women combat pilots to enforce the no-fly zone over southern Iraq. Building on the accomplishments of past generations, Navy women have fulfilled the legacy left to



OPM sharing Demo Plan survey information

The Office of Personnel Management (OPM) recently released results of a 1993 survey evaluating the Personnel Demonstration Project at various Navy installations. A sample of employees at Albuquerque (24), White Sands (42), China Lake (1193), Point Mugu (2149) and San Diego (619, formerly NOSC, currently NRAD) responded to the survey. Both China Lake and San Diego have been involved in employee attitude surveys since the Personnel Demonstration Project was established at their sites more than 15 years ago. Employees at Albuquerque, White Sands and Point Mugu have only recently joined in the Demonstration Project and this was the first survey since their involvement. Therefore all employees at those sites were given the opportunity to respond. The outcome of this survey will serve as base line data at these sites.

The results of the survey are reported by site and by occupational group. The questions are split into the following categories-job satisfaction, pay satisfaction, views on performance appraisal, control over work, organization climate and views on the Demonstration Project. Most of survey consisted of a series of statements about jobrelated conditions and asked the respondent to what extent they agreed or disagreed with the statement in question.



China Lake's Visitor Center (Pass & I.D.) has provided information regarding personnel badging and vehicle decal

Requests for official visitor badges may be hand carried or sent via fax to 939-3996. Most requests will be processed and completed within three to five working days. No more than four requests will be processed by telephone.

Out-going visit requests may be hand carried or sent via guard mail. These requests will be processed and completed within one business day.

Controlled area access passes are issued for the purpose of granting access to restricted areas for nongovernment/contract employees who have a need to routinely enter that restricted area. Example: A spouse of a government/military member who has one vehicle and has to take a husband or wife to work in a restricted area. Upon

approval, the pass will be issued within three to five working days. Special Area Access Passes (SAAP

badges) are designed to be issued at the department level to their employees who must access a restricted area on an other-than-routine basis. A request can be made by sending a memorandum, signed by the department head, head of staff or department security officer, to the Visitor's Center, 824112D, or fax to 939-3996. Once received and approved, these will take approximately three to five days to issue.

Government personnel badging can be completed on a walk-in basis. It is recommended that the badge be renewed approximately one month prior to its expiration date.

For vehicle decal's, the requester must have in their possession a current driver's license, current vehicle registration and proof of insurance. Motorcycles



Profile: Milt Burford, 7.0 leader speaks of his career at China Lake

That you see, is what you get," Milt Burford said with a smile. Sometimes described as "an institution," Burford really didn't want to take time out for an interview. But, after being convinced that there really is at least one NAWCW-PNS employee out there who doesn't know the leader of the division's Corporate Operations Competency, Burford spoke of his 33-year China Lake career.

Burford provides leadership and management of a variety of functions that span all sites, including human resources, manpower and workload planning, financial management, information management, security, public affairs and legal services.

This is the first time Burford has worked on the support services side of China Lake, and while he was surprised at first to be appointed, he said he's not disappointed with the job. "There are a lot of interesting people here. A lot of the jobs we do are mandated; services that we provide, services required, but not understood by the technical commu-

A typical work day for Burford is composed of several meetings, video teleconferencing meetings, two or more conversations with the people in Wash-

ington, D. C., two electronic mail systems and precious little time to work through the piles of papers on his table. "I've never not wanted to go to work," he said, "Some days are harder than others, but I'm always up for a challenge." Burford has been here long enough to

have seen other organizational changes to the China Lake community and he says that a recent major change, the marriage of China Lake, Point Mugu and the New Mexico sites, is functioning as it was intended and on balance remains healthy. Change is inevitable within any organization and Burford saw the transition from Naval Ordnance Test Station to Naval Weapons Center, gone through changes during the Vietnam era, watched the evolution from NWC to NAWCWPNS and NAWS and now the competency aligned organization. "Four or five years down the road there will probably be more changes, but that is to be expected," Burford said.

Concerning the possibility of more changes coming soon within the support organizations, as reported in the Ridgecrest newspapers recently, Burford said that there has always been a China Lake Reduction-In-Force (RIF) avoidance policy and there is no malicious intent on the part of management to do away with

A St. Louis, Mo., native, he graduat-

and Metallurgy in 1962 and came to work at NOTS that same year with a degree in mechanical engineering. As a junior professional engineer, he began his lengthy China Lake career in the Warhead Development Branch

Burford's experience at China Lake was interrupted by two years with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers from May of 1963 to May of 1965. He had earned an Army commission as a ROTC participant during his college days, and his tour of duty included serving as company commander of the 185th Heavy Engineering Maintenance Co. at the Army Depot in Granite City, Ill.

He returned to China Lake and old Code 40, working on warhead development projects and serving as program manager for the APAM cluster weapon. "I'd have to say that I got my biggest kick out of working on the APAM. It was full-spectrum, from conception to production to the fleet," he said.

In 1974 he was selected as associate division head of the Conventional Weapons Division of the Ordnance Systems Department. In August 1978 he assumed the division head position. Weapon systems and components under his direction included the CBU-59/B cluster weapon, the Mk 20 cluster weapon, the Gator Air-Delivered Land Mind Cluster weapon, Fuel-Air Explo-

Launched FAE, Advanced 500-and 1000-pound conventional bombs, Quiet Bomb, Smokeye, Harpoon-Sidewinder-HARM warheads, Mk 80 General Purpose Bomb upgrades and new environmentally resistant explosives.

Burford said he considers the transition to head of the Electronic Warfare Threat Environment Simulation (EWTES) Division in 1983 as an outstanding personal accomplishment in his career. While there, he was responsible for the development and operation of threat radar replicas, radar simulators and surrogates and instrumentation.

He left EWTES proper in the spring of 1987 to head the Aerosystems Department. With this appointment, his previous division became a part of a reorganized Aerosystems Department. The department conducted RDT&E on personnel emergency and premeditated parachute systems, missile recovery systems, airborne telemetry and threat radar

Burford became head of the Aircraft Weapons Integration Department in July 1991. His department provided studies, research, development, evaluation and technical support for tactical aircraft, avionics and weapons systems.

Barbara Gallagher (Smith's assistant), Bob, Dave and Juanita Morton (a physical science technician in Chemistry & Materials Branch) got together and figured out a doable solution for both the Michelson Lab and Lauritsen Lab compounds," Smith explained.

Employees within the compounds may now easily dispose of their hazardous waste by contacting Morton at 939-1658, who will take responsibility for insuring that all the materials are properly identified, appropriate paperwork is completed and storing the material for removal from the area.

"I already collect the hazardous waste from the chemistry & materials people," she said. "It just seemed to make sense for me to volunteer."

Morton explained that moving the hazardous waste from one part of the compound to another wasn't really a problem, but to take it away from the compound, specific steps need to be taken.

Part of Morton's job is to ensure that those steps are taken and to provide profile sheets that identifies every item that is to be removed. She then calls the Haz-

ardous Waste Transfer & Storage Facility for someone to come by and pick it

"The Hazardous Waste Transfer & Storage Facility is a facility on base that has been permitted by the state for storing hazardous waste until it is transferred to a proper disposal/treatment facility," she explained.

"While I am limited to taking only small quantities of hazardous waste, such as in gallon bottles or smaller, I can make arrangements for bigger quantities to be picked up."

"It's really good having one central location," said Bob Moore, an environmental health technician with the Hazardous Waste Transfer and Storage Facility. "When hazardous waste is dumped illegally, it adds to the cost of removing it. We can't move hazardous waste until we know what it is, which means times and money analyzing it. I think having a central location will be beneficial."

Smith is also happy with the idea, saying, "We (the facility) are benefactors of someone else's efforts. I think it's just wonderful."
